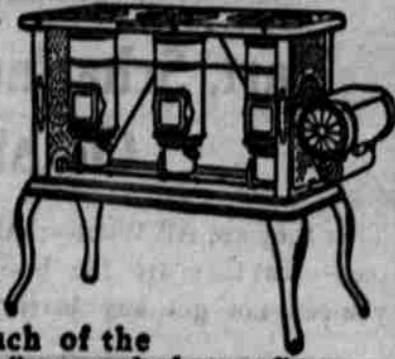

LATEST NEWS FROM WARRENTON

LADIES' AID SOCIETY INAUGURATES MOST POPULAR LADY CONTEST—FOURTH OF JULY MOVEMENT STARTED.

WARRENTON, May 31.—Eleven members of the Ladies' Aid Society met at the home of Mrs. Walter C. Barnhart yesterday afternoon. An exquisite sofa cushion was presented to the Society by Mrs. John Cobb, with the suggestion that the cushion be disposed of in the following manner, a ballot being taken to ascertain who is the most popular lady (over 15 years of age) in and around this town, votes to be obtained by purchase, the winner of the competition to be presented with the cushion and the proceeds of the sale of votes to go into the funds of the Society for a special purpose not mentioned publicly. The generous gift was accepted and it was decided to charge 10 cents per vote. A further motion was carried that the prize be placed on exhibition in the various business premises in town. It was also decided to give another social in Warren's Hall on Saturday evening, June 15, at which time the election will take place and the prize awarded to the successful lady. At the close of the meeting Mrs. Barnhart invited the members to partake of refreshments she had prepared for them. A delightful hour was then spent enjoying the sumptuous repast, and genial company of the hostess.

There is to be a "rag-time" dance at Hammond next Saturday evening. The invitations state that no persons in glad rags will be admitted. Special music from Astoria has been engaged for the occasion.

Several prominent men here are discussing a proposition to arrange a good program of outdoor amusement etc., together with two or three addresses from the best men attainable on July the Fourth. Providing sufficient encouragement is given they will doubtless call a meeting at an early date to discuss the various details. Such an undertaking deserves the hearty co-operation of all residents, therefore, it is hoped the suggestion will become a certainty.

MURDERER ARRESTED.

Wanted For Crime Committed Two Years Ago.

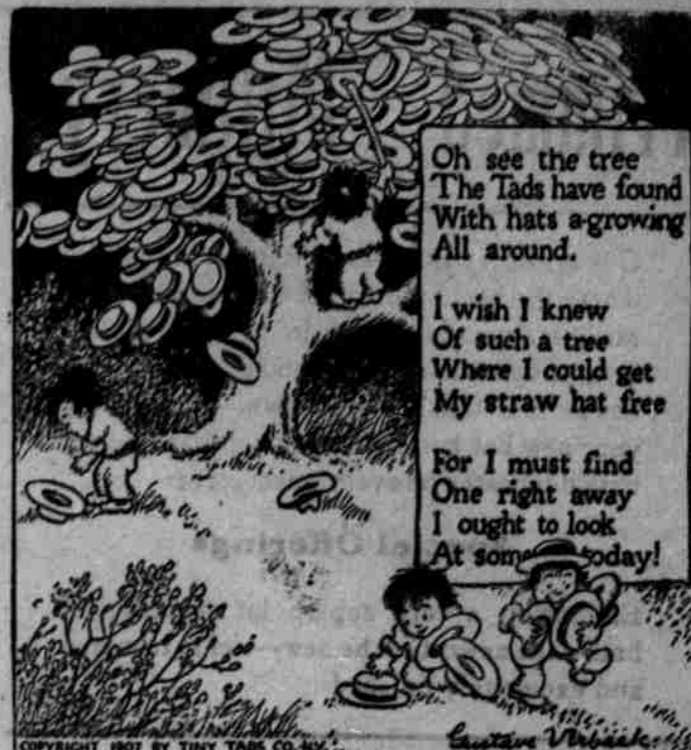
CHICAGO, May 31.—While watching a memorial parade Ernest Martini 27 years old who for two years, according to his confession, has gone afoot through many of the Western States, weighed down by fear of arrest for the killing of Frank Murda, a Chicago saloonkeeper, was arrested yesterday. He had been in the Garfield Park Sanitarium since May 20.

When the Memorial Day parade formations were being brought to order he stood in front of the sanitarium watching the maneuvers. Three policemen saw him and in a few minutes he was locked up. Last night Martini gave out a confession of the killing of Murda. He freely admitted the crime, but said the act was in self defense. According to the statement he said he had always been haunted by the horror of his act and feared he was losing his mind. The murder of Murda occurred on August 6, 1905, and resulted from a quarrel over his refusal to sell drinks after closing time.
