FRENCH PEASANTS.

They Know Nothing About Cooking as a Fine Art.

We are accustomed to think of cooking as being a universal art among the French. We seem to have heard vaguely of delicious repasts concocted out of nothing with the help of a charcoal fire and a small pot.

Certainly among the bourgeoisie that miracle seems sometimes to accomplish itself, but in the matter of cooking as a fine art the peasant belongs to a different world. He knows very little about it and does not wish to know because it is regarded as a costly and unnecessary luxury. His breakfast consists of thin soup made of beans and water, with perhaps a taste of bacon for flavoring, and thin slices of brown bread to give it substance. Potatoes and one other dish—frequently a coarse sort of pancake—form the noonday meal. The supper will be more sustaining, with thin wine or cider as a beverage.

Jacques Bonhomme has a perfect genius for discovering things which are good for food, which yet cost nothing, and sometimes he eats things that seem revolting to us, though I am quite willing to admit that clean or unclean in the matter of food is largely a question of inherited prejudice.

Normandy is a rich province, and its peasants are better fed than those of other parts of the country. There is a tradition that in olden days meat was so cheap and plentiful that it was used to feed the pigs at the monasteries. They drink a great deal of cider, especially in the "pays de Caux," and it is said that this is the explanation of their bad teeth. The dress of the peasant women in this part of Normandy is extremely picturesque, with the long frilled cloak and the hood, which sometimes reveals a pretty, piquant face.

As a contrast to the general frugality of the peasants' lives there are the wedding feasts and other festivities, when they eat enormously, apparently having the power of laying in a stock against times of comparative fasting. —New Orleans Times-Democrat.

CEDRINO BREAKS RECORD.

Vanderbilt Cup Driver Lowers to Mile Track Record.

NEY WORK, May 31.—Manuel Cedrino, the Vanderbilt cup driver broke the record for middle-weight cars at the Empire City track yesterday, scoring the distance in 9 minutes 47 1-5 seconds. The previous record was 10 minutes 12 1-5 seconds held by Benin.

Cedrino continued on to 15 miles and covered the distance in 14 minutes 45 seconds, also a world's record for this class.

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TAILORS IN A RIOT.

Refused to Permit a Performance That Satirized Their Craft.

In 1700 Foote had produced a burlesque, the author of which has never been discovered, entitled "The Tailors; a Tragedy For Warm Weather." Downton announced the revival of this piece for his benefit. As the title implies, it was a satire upon the sartorial craft, and upon the bills being issued an indignation meeting was convened by the knights of the needle, who vowed to oppose the performance by might and main.

Menacing letters were sent to Downton telling him that 17,000 tailors would attend to his piece, and one, who signed himself "Death," added that 10,000 men could be found if necessary. These threats were laughed at by the actors, but when night came it was discovered that the craft were in earnest and that with few exceptions they had contrived to secure every seat in the house, while a mob without still squeezed for admission. The moment Downton appeared upon the stage there was a hideous uproar and some one threw a pair of shears at him.

Not a word would the rioters listen to, nor would they accept any compromise in the way of changing the piece. Within howled and hissed without intermission hundreds of exasperated tailors; outside howled and bellowed thousands of raging tailors, who attempted to storm the house. So formidable did the riot wax that a magistrate had to be sent for and special constables called out, but these were helpless against overwhelming odds, so a troop of life guards was ultimately summoned, who, after making sixteen prisoners, put the rest to flight. —American Tailor and Cutter.
