BOISE TRIAL STARTED

(Continued from page 1)

exchanges. They protested against the charge that the Federation was guilty of "scores of murders" and the assertion that the conspiracy extended back to the first trouble in North Idaho which was years before the accused was a member of the organization, and they accused Hawley of arguing the case in the opening statement. They dotted the records with exceptions and over-ruled objections and finally got to an agreement whereby they could protect their rights as to the whole opening statement. Judge Wood permitted a wide scope in the opening statement on the assurance of Hawley that the latter could show the existence, later, of a conspiracy which is charged, and make the necessary legal connection. Eight witnesses were examined and there would have been time for three or four more if the available supply of the state had not unexpectedly run out, enforcing an adjournment soon after 3 o'clock. The witnesses today were all from Caldwell and those who did not tell the story of the crime itself were called to locate Harry Orchard, who went to the town as Thomas Hogan, at various hotels and around the Steunenberg home, and to show that two months before the commission of crime, J. L. Simpkins, a member of the executive board of the Western Federation of Miners had joined Orchard and had lived with him for several days in the same room. C. F. Wayne who passed out of the gate 20 minutes before the explosion, told of the shocking condition of Steunenberg's body, when in response to a call from Mrs. Steunenberg he ran to him.

Dr. Geo. Described the body. He found the legs broken to fragments by the great force of the explosion while the skin that covered them was unmarked. Three other witnesses traced Orchard's movements around town at various times before and after the crime and then came Julian Steunenberg, son of the dead statesman to tell how Orchard had three days before the murder inquired of him about his father's movements. Young Steunenberg said he was on the way home when the explosion occurred and was two blocks behind his father. Three other witnesses traced the movements of Orchard and Simpkins. The latter was identified by a photograph and was that of a man known to them as "Simmons." The defense briefly cross-examined several witnesses and a line of questions were aimed to make it clear that Orchard had shown himself conspicuously on the streets at Caldwell and neither he nor Simpkins sought to conceal their movements. It may be that this was done to lay the foundation for a counter conspiracy charge, that it is thought the defense will bring forward.

Harry Orchard, the self-confessed murderer of Governor Steunenberg who will go on the stand probably tomorrow afternoon to testify against William D. Haywood was brought to Boise this evening from Idaho penitentiary. For some hours he was closeted with the attorneys for the prosecution and it is probable that tonight he will be locked up in the county jail. This is the first time Orchard has been out of prison since he was brought from Caldwell immediately after the assassination. Notwithstanding reports of possible violence to Orchard on the part of Haywood's friends, the prisoner was surrounded by little precaution during his drive to the city. Orchard looks well and shows little apprehension on account of the ordeal he will be called on to face while on the stand. It is understood that his cross-examination will be conducted by E. F. Richardson.

ADDITIONAL SHIPPING NEWS.

Two more British ships have been listed for the Columbia river, they being the St. Mirren and the Port Patrick. As reports declare that both are to sail from Newcastle, New South Wales, for the Columbia River, it is thought that they are coal laden, and will not doubt arrive here about the last of Autumn. The Port Patrick is well known here, having spent several months in the Columbia about four years ago. At that time she was in command of Captain Bond.

Another Great Lakes steamer, the J. H. Devereux, will be brought around to the Pacific Coast. She is en route from Cleveland to Chicago with coal. She will load grain in Chicago for Montreal, starting later for New York, where a new crew will be shipped to bring her around the Horn. The J. H. Devereux will go in the lumber trade between Puget Sound and the Columbia and California ports.

General freight will be brought from the Thames or some port in Wales to Astoria by the French bark Bayard. The craft is out about three months

from here with grain for the United Kingdom. She was chartered at 17s 6d, a smaller rate than is usual. The charterers have the option of sending the Bayard to the Sound.

EARTHQUAKE AT HSING KIANG

Much Property and Many Lives Lost in Quake.

VICTORIA, B. C., June 4.—The steamer Shawmut brought news of a disastrous loss of life following an earthquake at Hsing Kiang. A telegram received from Pekin by the Hoshi Shimbun of Tokio shortly before the Shawmut sailed reported that 4000 persons were crushed to death, a vast number of houses destroyed and many thousand persons left starving. The Empress Dowager has telegraphed urgent instructions to the local governors to take measures to relieve the distress.
