Stolen—

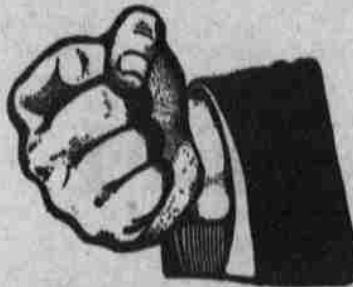

FOURTH OF JULY CELEBRATION

FOURTH OF JULY COMMITTEE MET LAST EVENING AND FORMULATED PLANS FOR THE COMING CELEBRATION.

The Fourth of July Committee composed of High School students met at the city hall last evening to consider the plans for the coming celebration this year. The young people have taken hold of the matter with an enthusiastic spirit and give promise of putting up a celebration up to the usual standard.

The chairmen of the various committees were appointed and in turn will select the other members of their respective committees. Those appointed were as follows: Auditing committee, Maybelle Larsen; advertising and printing, Yvon Guilleme; parade, Hamilton Garner; music and fireworks, Donald Stewart; literary exercises, Miss Birdie Wise; amusements, Percy Tagg; decorations, Mary Clark; subscriptions, Leo Tuomala. Mr. Wilson Stine of the First National Bank was elected treasurer of the committee.

The advantages of holding a naval parade and a naval display of fireworks were discussed at length but no definite action was taken. The secretary was instructed to extend an invitation to the various fraternal societies of the city, to the schools, to the commander at Fort Stevens, to the fire department, police department and to the city council asking that each participate in the parade.

Professors Clark and Garmen of the public schools were elected members of the advisory board. A motion was carried allowing the secretary the sum of \$30 for his work in connection with the committee up to the time when the accounts are closed.

The subscription committee will start to work at once canvassing the city in an endeavor to get together enough funds to defray the expenses of a creditable celebration which is to prove their capability in the matter. The meeting was adjourned to some evening in the forepart of the coming week, when the report of the subscription committee will be heard.

Salme Resting Easy—

Otto Salme, of Deep River, who was mistaken for a bear and shot by Alfred Lamppa on Tuesday is doing better than was expected. His pulse was normal yesterday and no symptoms of a serious nature manifested themselves during the day. A second examination by Dr. Estes yesterday developed the fact that the ball had struck the collarbone and was then deflected downward. The case will be watched expectantly until the man is strong enough and then another effort will be made to locate the bullet.

Peterson has bought out the rights of the two latter and the company which owns a million feet of lumber on the old Johnson Slough will in the future be run by Messrs. Peterson & Frye.

Horses Killed—

At a farm near Troutdale, belonging to a Mr. Campbell three horses were killed last week. The farm lies on the railway and the horses strayed onto it, and were killed by a passing train. One was a broodmare in foal belonging to Dr. C. W. Barr. The foal was born and is still living, and it seems likely to recover all deleterious effects of the shock.

New Steamer—

Captain J. W. Babbidge & Sons have let a contract to Wilson Brothers, the boat builders, for a new steamer. Her dimensions will be 76 feet in length, 17 feet beam, with a 6 1/2 foot hold. The engines will be 4 1/2 inches compound of 100 horsepower. They have already been delivered. The boilers at present in the Volga, which are quite new, will be used in the new boat.
