DEAD BODY PICKED OUT OF WATER

FOUND FLOATING NEAR SMITH'S POINT BY FISHERMEN—PROBABLY BODY OF BOATPULLER THAT WAS DROWNED LAST MONTH.

When returning home about 6 o'clock last night from fishing Edward Somers discovered a dead body floating in the water. He brought the body to the Union Fisherman's Cannery for which he is working. Later the deputy coroner went to the cannery for the body. On being taken from the water it was found that the features were wholly unrecognizable and at present it is only surmised that the man is the boatpuller who was drowned by the overturning of a fish boat some two weeks ago. The man drowned at that time was a very big man fully six feet in height, and thus far the description of the body found last night tallies. There was in the pockets of the clothes or on the man's person, by which he could be identified—nothing but a pocket knife—and he now lies at the coroner's awaiting possible identification. The man

was dressed as a fisherman and the one boot he had on was a long leather boot such as fishermen wear.

CAMERA DELEGATE.

Labor Unions Replace Walking Delegate With New Official.

CHICAGO, June 6.—The traditional "Walking Delegate" was replaced by a person carrying a "Snap Shot" camera under his arm.

The latter was the "Camera delegate," something new in organized labor circles. The "Camera delegate," is a combination of walking delegates, and photographer, whose duty is to take pictures of buildings under construction, so that he call a strike from his office without visiting the job. The sheet metal workers union introduced the new official, and the other 34 unions in the Associated Building Trades are getting ready to adopt them. It is their plan to photograph every building in the city where union men are at work, as well as a number where non-unionists are employed. Sufficient data will be gathered in connection with the pictures to enable the union officials thus to keep track of the evolution of the building industry from day to day. The difficulty facing the plan is the possible objection of the photographers union, which may object to the "camera delegates" on the ground that they are, from its viewpoint, non-union.

WATERFRONT ITEMS

Start to Unload the Steamer Daisy Freeman.

HYNDFORD HAS RECORD LOAD

The Record Cargo Is 72,512 Barrels of Flour For the Orient—Supplies of Cement and Structural Iron Anxiously Awaited Up River.

The British ship Dalgomar, bound for the Columbia River with cement and structural iron, is anxiously waited up the river. So short has the supply of material become that a tug has been ordered to meet the ship immediately she is sighted. The Dalgomar is out about 150 days from London, and her arrival has been expected for a fortnight. She has on board a large quantity of cement, 650 tons of structural iron, and much other building material.

With similar freight consigned to the same company the German ship Siam is out from Antwerp since February 2. On March 5 she was spoken in 15 degrees south latitude and 35 degrees west longitude, having made a smart run on the first part of the passage. Few wind-jammers have ever completed the same distance in less than 30 days. Had she maintained that pace the Siam would have been in the Columbia River by now. When spoken she was approaching the zone of the doldrums and she may have been held up indefinitely.

Following the Siam the French bark Vincennes is expected from Glasgow with a full cargo of building material. A number of exclusive cement cargoes should also arrive before summer is far advanced. The fleet is bringing plenty of material, it is claimed, to keep building operations under full sway. If the craft arrive on anything like their scheduled dates. The Dalgomar, now due, has sufficient building material to keep things moving until the other vessels arrive.

The steamer F. A. Kilburn, Captain McLelland, arrived from San Francisco and way ports, more than a day late. When she arrived off Coos Bay the black fog was thick enough to cut, the sailors say. It is considered dangerous to make an attempt to cross in over the bar and the steamer remained on the outside for 24 hours, when the fog lifted. The Kilburn brought 90 passengers, all she can accommodate, and a full cargo of freight. At San Francisco A. Wetterquist succeeded P. Peterson as first officer. The steamer will leave on the return tomorrow night.

Work was started on the Daisy Freeman yesterday morning. She was moved from the depot dock to the O. R. & N. Alongside of her was a pile-driver to supply steam, her own engines being useless on account of the water in her hold. After her cargo is discharged she will be drydocked and repaired.

The steamship Hyndford came down about 11:30 yesterday and waited for last night's tide. She is loaded with wheat and will call at Shanghai, Mogee and will call at Shanghai, Moji and Taku at the mouth of the Tsin

Carrying 72,512 barrels of flour, valued at \$278,312, the British steamship Hyndford, Captain Horne, left down this morning for the Far East. Her cargo will be delivered at Moji, Shanghai and Taku. It is the largest flour shipment taken out of here this season.

The barkentine Echo of the Simpson Lumber Company's fleet has been chartered to load lumber from the Knapperton Mills for South America. She will load the latter part of this month.

The schooner Irene presented a mighty gay appearance yesterday when she was dressed in honor of Captain Mitchell's bride. It was expected that she would be towed to sea last evening.

Balfour, Guthrie & Co. have chartered the barkentine Echo to transport a cargo of lumber from the Columbia to Valparaiso. The Echo will handle 950,000 feet of lumber.

The steamer Lurline was down on time after missing a day and she had a considerable quantity of freight awaiting her with which she got away about 8 o'clock.

The schooner Churchill cleared for San Francisco. She loaded 850,000 feet of lumber at Knapperton. There were some doubts about her getting a crew.
