## STEEL SITUATION

Coming Year Will Have Largest Producing Capacity.

## FURNACES NEED REPAIRS

New Furnaces Under Construction Will Add 3,000,000 Tons To the Annual Output of the Country—Coke Industry Also Receives An Impetus.

PITTSBURG, June 6.—Despite rumors in the iron and steel market abroad as well as in this country a canvass of the industry warrants the statement that the last half of 1907 and the first half of the year 1908 will witness the largest producing capacity in the history of the United States and Canada. It is estimated that new furnace construction will add at least 2,000,000 tons to the prospective capacity of the country. Last year the local output of all the furnaces was 25,307,000 tons. A corresponding stimulus, it is said, will be given the coke trade, inasmuch as it is estimated that the new pig iron furnaces capacity will consume the product of between 6000 and 7000 coke ovens.

"The cause of the shutting down of furnaces at a time of actual famine of pig iron," said an expert in the trade, is well understood by men connected with the business. It is a case of necessity, superinduced by a little lack of confidence last year.

"There were comparatively few persons who had faith in a continuance of last year's activity in the iron market. During the closing months of 1906, nearly everybody was willing to admit there would be a reaction in 1907. Producers of pig iron, therefore, booked orders for this year's delivery under the impression that current depression will fall off and rush production. With the idea that there will be plenty of demand this spring and summer for long delayed repairs. This lull in current demand did not occur and as a consequence overcrowding furnaces all of last year's needed repairs now are more numerous and imperative."

## NEED THOUSANDS OF OPERATORS.

Railroad Service Opens Big Field For Women in South and West.

CHICAGO, June 6.—Ten thousand telegraph operators could find steady employment in the south and west at wages ranging from \$55 to \$100 a month. January 1 the law limiting the hours of railway telegraphers to nine hours goes into effect. This will further increase the demand for operators and should, railway men believe, bring a large number of women telegraphers into the field.

A western railroad official, who has himself come up from the ranks of telegraph operators, said today:

"I am surprised that the progressive and independent young women of the country have not already taken up telegraphy more seriously. The work is light, the hours reasonable, and women are peculiarly adapted for this occupation. The woman operator is faithful, circumspect, bright and exact. From the railroad manager's point of view, the only objection to her is that after acquiring experience and reaching a good position she gets married in nine cases out of ten."

"The opportunity for women to enter the telegraph service of the railroads and secure pleasant employment is evidenced by the fact that at least 10,000 competent operators could now find positions in the south and west at good wages. When the nine-hour law goes into effect it is bound largely to increase the demand for this class of employees, for even under present conditions it is hard to get all the competent operators needed. The constant extension of the railroads with their attending telegraph lines enlarges an opportunity of which I believe the women of the country should take advantage."

## IDAHO-NEVADA POWER COMPANY.

Company Aims To Place Electricity In Reach of New Towns.

DENVER, June 6.—Articles of incorporation were filed with the Secretary of State yesterday for the Idaho-Nevada Power Company with a capital stock of \$7,500,000. The company has for its directors a number of Colorado Springs men, who are associated with eastern capitalists. Headquarters will be maintained in Denver.

This concern which will operate principally in Idaho and Nevada, is to be an auxiliary to the Central Colorado Power

Company, recently incorporated in Colorado with a capitalization of \$22,000,000. In this concern are Myron T. Herick, former governor of Ohio, Thomas F. Walsh and David H. Moffat, multimillionaires of Colorado and a number of other prominent capitalists of Colorado and the east.

The aim of these gigantic concerns is to place power within easy reach of struggling town sites, mining industries, electric car lines, etc.

## NORDICA SAILS FOR EUROPE.

Will Obtain Plans and Specifications for American Bayreuth.

NEW YORK, June 6.—Mme. Lillian Nordica will sail for Europe today by LaSavole on an important mission connected with her plan announced yesterday of establishing on the Hudson with-in easy reaching distance of this city an American Institute of Music.

The probable location of this new institute, will be a site some ten miles north of Ossining, between the Croton reservoir and the Hudson River, where a tract of 20 acres has recently been purchased by the singer at a cost of \$100,000. Here an opportunity is afforded for the construction of a replica of the Wagner Theater at Bayreuth. One at least of the objectives of Mme. Nordica's trip abroad is to obtain copies of the original plans of the structure.

In Munich there is already a structure as that she intends for America. This is also modeled on the original plans of that structure.

Mme. Nordica hoped to bring back with her the director of the Munich institution to act as consulting director in the formative stages of her project. It is believed that Walter Damrosch has been consulted about the tentative plans and it is thought likely that he will be associated in the direction of the institute. It is hoped that the project will be brought to its completed state by the Summer of 10.

## TEXTBOOKS CHANGED.

Textbook Commission Will Make Important Changes.

SALEM, Or., June 6.—When the State Textbook Commission took recess at noon only five or six studies of the High School course had been under consideration, in which books have been temporarily adopted, subject to revision and change at any time, and the board was wrestling with the subject of history with no conclusions reached. The studies in which preliminary disposals were made this morning, it is understood, are astronomy, zoology, political economy and geology. The commission will not finish the High School course before 5 o'clock this afternoon and the deliberations may extend late into the night, but the board will finish its work today.

It is understood that important changes will be made in nearly all the textbooks in the high school courses, with the exception of astronomy, in which study the American Book Company's book will probably be retained, but the most difficult task so far encountered by the board is the general history course, in which an entirely new set of books may be chosen from that of the MacMillan Company, composed of six books, now in use. The American Book Company has a complete set of four books in this course, as have also some other companies, and Messrs. Gunn and Sullivan, for the American Book Company, and Mr. Ellsworth, representing the MacMillan Company, were called in consultation this morning and asked to explain, it is understood, the prices and adaptability of their respective sets of books for grade work. It is also understood a simpler and more practical study of English literature will be substituted for Brooke's compilation, which is now in use, and considered too technical and heavy for high school work. Rhetoric and English composition will be made to do the work of higher English in the first and second grades of high school work.

## OKUMA REPLIES

Renders Opinion at New York World's Request.

## FAIR TREATMENT ESSENTIAL

Former Premier of Japan Hopes American Public Will Stop Boxer-Like Outrages To His Countrymen—Reminds Them of Washington's Farewell Address.

NEW YORK, June 6.—Count Okuma, former leader of the Progressives, the opposition party in Japan, in response to a request by the New York World, cabled that paper the following opinion regarding the incidents in San Francisco, in which Japanese were involved.

"I deeply regret that anti Japanese outrages are being repeated in San Francisco. We, as a nation, were not satisfied with the settlement of the school incident, which resulted in unjust discrimination against, and the actual expulsion of Japanese immigrants.

"We hoped that the principles laid but in the enlightened message of President Roosevelt last December would prevail, and that every unjust discrimination against the Japanese would be stopped.

Repetition of injustice against the Japanese will seriously injure our warm feeling toward America and our traditional friendship, will be weakened thereby.

"Fair and just treatment is essential to maintain friendship.

"Repeated outrageous acts will not only damage American interests but also discredit American civilization.

For the sake of justice and humanity we sincerely appeal to the American public to stop Boxer-like outrages and unfair discrimination against Japanese and pray that Washington's farewell address be not forgotten by the American people."

Count Okuma has been minister of Finance, Foreign Minister and Premier of Japan. He is now the head of Waseda University, which he founded and largely endowed.

The Hochi, which is supporting Count Okuma in his position on the American question says this morning that the San Francisco outrages are worse than the murder of the missionaries in China which resulted in the occupation of Kiao Chow. Who would blame an appeal to the last measures, if impotency to protect the treaty rights is proved? We hope, however, that Ambassador Oki will be firm enough to make the Washington Government quickly take measures to mete out justice to the Japanese.

## TOW BOAT VULCAN BURNS.

Cause of Fire Unknown—Loss \$20,000; Insurance \$6000.

PORTLAND, June 6.—The river towboat Vulcan was burned to the water's edge tonight in a spectacular fire which illuminated the waterfront of both side of the river and attracted enormous crowds. The cause of the fire is unknown but it is surmised that it was ignition of oil from her fuel tanks. The loss is \$20,000, the insurance \$6000. The boat belonged to the Willamette and Columbia River Towing Co.
