TWO BOYS ARRESTED ON WENONA

SHERIFF RECEIVES TELEGRAM FROM KNAPPTON TO ARREST TWO PASSENGERS FROM THAT TOWN LAST NIGHT.

Last night Sheriff Pomeroy received a message to arrest two men on the Wenona on her arrival at the Callender dock. When the vessel arrived the sheriff was there with his deputy to meet her and the two men turned out to be two young fellows who had skipped their board bill and had more or less invited serious trouble.

It appears that Captain William Rayfield had hired one of the lads in Portland to work on his farm and that the boys not wishing to separate he had invited the other one to come down and stay on his farm till he found work. Captain Rayfield advanced their fares, paid their board bill, and went so far as to buy boots and tobacco for the one who was to work for him. The other boy could not find work that suited him and eventually both of them decided to skip out. However, Captain Rayfield was up to their moves and accompanied them here. The sheriff took them in charge and after taking them to the office pointed out to them the folly of their ways. He also confiscated their baggage till such time as they were prepared to pay off their indebtedness to Captain Rayfield, which amounted to \$14. The boys are now endeavoring to obtain work in Astoria till such time as they can square their indebtedness and earn enough money to carry them back to Portland.
