## WARRENTON ITEMS OF INTEREST

LADIES' AID SOCIETY HOLDS AN-  
OTHER SOCIAL WITH MANY NEW  
AND NOVEL FEATURES—SOCIAL

WARRENTON, Or., June 18.—Last  
Saturday evening the Ladies' Aid So-  
ciety gave their second social, since  
their organization, in Warren's Hall.  
The affair was an all round success. Ice  
cream and cake was sold in abundance,  
despite the cold, wet weather prevailing  
outside. Perhaps the most attractive  
feature to the money spenders was the  
fish pond. Here were crowds continually  
flocking around Mr. I. Stanton de-  
manding the permit to fish. This gen-  
tleman granted the requests of indi-  
viduals as rapidly as possible, and  
charged 10 cents for each time the hook  
was thrown, however seeing that a  
catch was promised on all occasions,  
no one complained about the repeated  
taxation. Two Gypsies, especially en-  
gaged for the evening, foretold the fu-  
ture happiness, or otherwise, of their  
patrons, for the small sum of a dime.  
If their predictions are correct there  
are several unattached residents who  
will eventually be rich and married. In  
fact, briefly speaking, Warrenton now  
possesses the right material for good  
wives and wealthy self-made husbands.  
The home-made candy store transacted  
considerable business with those who  
possessed a sweet tooth. Originally it  
was intended to present a cushion do-  
nated by Mrs. J. Cobb, to the lady re-  
ceiving the largest number of votes, at  
the close of this social. However, when  
the ballots were counted it was found  
that insufficient votes had been pur-  
chased to justify the society parting  
with the prize, it was therefore decided  
to hold the competition open until the  
next entertainment. So far the ballot  
places Miss Edna Case in the lead.

### CABLE LINE NON-UNION.

California Street Line of Frisco Will  
Start in Few Days.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 18.—The Cal-  
ifornia street cable line will resume op-  
eration within two or three days, with  
non-union men at the old rate of pay.  
The officials of the company are only  
waiting to finish some repair work at  
the lower end of the line before starting  
out the cars. A number of the old men  
ready to return to work.

"We are going to establish open shop  
on the California street line," President  
Stetson said last night. "We have had  
some men in our employ for a long time  
and we would prefer to have them run  
the cars for us again. But we will deal  
with the men individually only. If they  
are not willing to come back on that  
basis we will have to fill their places.  
We cannot afford to pay more than  
the old rate, which was established by  
arbitration at 30, 31 and 32 cents.  
"We will have nothing further to do  
with the Carmen's Union. The men in-  
dividually are good men and we should  
prefer to have them in our employ  
again. But we will not deal with them  
as an organization."

NEW YORK, June 18.—Advices from

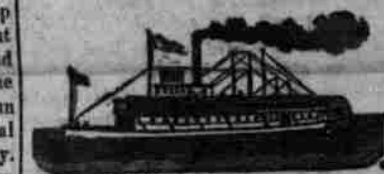
