WATERFRONT ITEMS

Five Vessels Cleared From Here
Yesterday

ASCOT HAS RECORD IN FLOUR

The Steamer Telegraph Beats Telephone In 12-Mile Run On Willamette With Boilers Fixed Has Matters All Her Own Way.

The British steamer Maori King arrived in the river yesterday and proceeded up to get orders from her charterers. It will be remembered that the Maori King was detailed originally with Russian, Chinese and Japanese emigrants to Guaymas, Mexico. The vessel had to call at San Diego to quell a disturbance which had arisen between the Russian and Chinese. Captain Duncan says that the Russians were to blame and moreover it appears that he has very little use for them. The big Benson log raft was sighted on the way up and all appeared to be well with her.

The British steamship Ascot, Captain Booth, completed loading close to 80,000 barrels of flour, valued at about \$350,000, yesterday, and will be down tomorrow for North China. It is the largest flour cargo set afloat in the harbor this season. The next largest was taken out on the British steamship Hyndford, which cleared for Dalny early this month with 72,512 barrels, valued at \$278,312. The Ascot is under charter to the Frank Waterhouse Company, and has been in port less than two weeks.

Long overdue, the British steamship Maori King arrived at Astoria from Santa Rosalia this morning, for Portland. It is said that she arrived too late to save her charter, to Frank Waterhouse, who engaged her some weeks ago to load flour here for North China. The matter will probably be settled today.

In less than seven hours the British steamship Strathgyle completed the run from Linton to Astoria yesterday.

With 3,200,512 feet of lumber, valued at \$57,027, the British steamship African Monarch cleared yesterday for Newchwang.

Both starting at the same time the Telephone and the Telegraph had an old time sprint down the Willamette yesterday and the Telegraph, with her boilers put in good shape beat her rival handsomely.

The British steamship Kalibia will be supplied with a lumber cargo at Rainier, where she arrived yesterday. She came from the Orient and carries a crew of 135 Mohammedans.

The steamer Yosemite cleared yesterday with 300,000 feet of lumber from Tongue Point. This was in addition to what she had already loaded at Tillamook.

The steamer F. A. Kilburn sailed for San Francisco and way ports last night with a full cargo and all the passengers she could handle.

The towboat Harvest Queen was down yesterday afternoon with the ship Emily Reid and was to return to Kalama for the John Palmer.

The Roanoke left out from the Calender dock at an early hour yesterday with a full complement of passengers and freight.

The steamer Washington had a cargo of 550,000 feet of lumber loaded at Rainier when she cleared.

The steamship Alliance went out early yesterday morning for Coos Bay.

The steamer F. A. Kilburn left out yesterday morning for Frisco.

NEW ZEALAND QUAKE.

AUCKLAND, N. Z., June 21.—A severe earthquake occurred at Tonna, one of the southern most of the Tonga Islands in the Pacific Ocean on June 12. 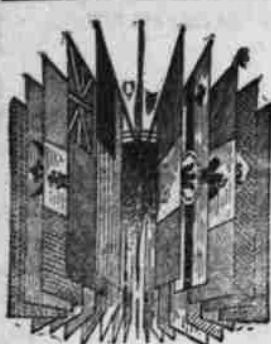
