POLICE COMMISSIONER RETURNS

HAS BEEN ON A TRIP OF INSPECTION TO HIS NUMEROUS LUMBER INTERESTS.

Police Commissioner Martin Ford returned yesterday from a business trip to Toledo and Yaquina Bay points and Bacoa. At Toledo the Fir & Spruce Lumber Company in which he is interested are getting things in shape to do business and have started in to cut lumber, but they are being delayed on account of some of their machinery not arriving, as the firm that has the order has a strike on their hands. They have just completed a logging road of one mile up in the timber and they expect shortly to be in shape to cut at least 60,000 feet per day. The Curtis Lumber Company, he says, is shipping from Yaquina and have recently loaded the Leggett which took out 1,200,000 feet of lumber. She is expected back to take another cargo on the 25th. The new owners of the C. & E. R. R. are figuring on extensive repairs and betterments and have placed a large order with his company for ties and other building material which will keep them busy for some time. At their Bacoa plant, the Mutual Lumber Company, he found everything in fine shape and the mill running steadily and during the past three months they have averaged 90 cars per month.

NEW YORK, June 21.—Mrs. Annie Ryley, of 455 West Fortysixth street, Manhattan, was a prisoner in the Yorkville court yesterday charged by the driver of a bakery wagon with stealing a five cent loaf of bread from a doorstep. The prisoner, who said she was 34 years old, appeared half-crazed by the sufferings she declared she had gone through.

In the Yorkville court Magistrate Whitman heard her story. Her husband, had gotten out of work and had deserted her. She had no money and was taken sick a week ago. Since then not knowing that there were charitable organizations she could apply to, she said she had lived on the pickings of garbage pails, fighting vagrant dogs and cats for putrid scraps. The sight of the crisp, newly baked loaf lying on the doorstep, she said was too much for her and she took it.

NEW TIME CARD FOR JUNE 29TH

NIGHT TRAIN FROM PORTLAND
LEAVES 6:00 O'CLOCK AND ARRIVES ASTORIA 9:40.

The A. & C. R. R. Will issue a new time card to take effect June 29th. This takes the place of time card No. 32, which was put into effect June 2nd, but on which the greater majority of trains were annulled, until the summer beach season opens. The only change on the new card will be train No. 24 known as the Seaside express, which will leave Portland daily at 6:00 p. m. and will arrive at Astoria 9:40; Warrenton, 10:05; Seaside, 10:30, and Holladay, the terminus, at 10:35. This is the train that now leaves Portland every evening at 6:50. Charles Neuman died at Olney yesterday at the age of 93. Mr. Neuman was a veteran of the Civil War and a government pensioner. He was a member of the First Oregon Regiment and did his duty in the old war. The interment will take place at Greenwood today.

Possibilities—

There has been some talk recently amongst Eastern firms of establishing a distillery on the coast. As it happens there is no such thing in the State of Oregon. Mr. Greer, of the Western Distillery Company, of Peoria, Ill., has been in Astoria for several days looking over the ground and it is very much to the interest of Astorians to point out to Mr. Greer the fact that Beer Creek water is beyond all evil clear and pure. It appears that Mr. Greer's only difficulty at present is to find the requisite quality of water in requisite quantities, and the establishment of the distillery will follow immediately. The particular essentials at present are purity of water, and this has been made a sine qua non, by the recent "pure food" legislation.

Busy At The Iron Works—

The Astoria Iron Works have recently completed two large oil tanks each of the capacity of 4000 gallons, one of which has been delivered at Smith's Cold Storage. The other will shortly be turned over to Linderberger's Cold Storage.
