IN ASTORIA**

EIGHTH GRADE OF THE WARD SCHOOLS IN AFTERNOON AND HIGH SCHOOL IN EVENING HOLD EXERCISES.

From 2 o'clock in the afternoon till late last night, with a short interval, the Opera House of Astoria was filled with young people and old people all intent upon hearing the commencement exercises of the eighth grade of the Ward schools and of the High School pupils. One of the most noticeable features at each function was the abundance of beautiful flowers—indeed another rose festival appeared to be in full swing.

In the afternoon the pupils of the eighth grade of the Ward schools had the stage, the front of which was banked with beautiful blossoms. The program was rendered in a very pleasing manner, after which the Rev. W. S. Gilbert addressed the class and J. H. Eakin presented the diplomas.
