### GEORGIA RAILROAD DEAL.

Central of Georgia Will go Over to Rock Island.

NEW YORK, June 29.—The Times today says that control of the Central of Georgia Railroad, which was purchased on Wednesday, by Oakleigh Thorne and Marsden J. Perry, will eventually pass to the Rock-Island and Frisco interests, if predictions made in railroad circles prove well founded. It was said that Messrs. Thorne and Perry purchased the Central of Georgia, with an understanding between themselves and the Rock Island interests, that formal control of the road should pass to the St. Louis and San Francisco, after the expiration of the two years during which the present holders of the road have agreed to keep it an independent line.

It was pointed out that close relations have existed between Mr. Thorne and B. F. Yoakum, who is the guiding spirit in the affairs of the Rock Island Frisco systems. Mr. Yoakum is a director in the Trust Companies of America, of which Mr. Thorne is President

and in other ways he and Mr. Yoakum have co-operated in business undertakings.

The St. Louis and San Francisco system has a line into Birmingham, Ala., and at that point it connects indirectly with the Central of Georgia, whose lines run from Birmingham from Montgomery and from Chattanooga to the coast at Savannah. In addition to obtaining this outlet to the Atlantic seaboard, the Frisco, in acquiring the Central of Georgia, will come into control of a large amount of traffic originating in the territory served by the Central of Georgia.
