VICE-PRESIDENT'S BANQUET

GOVERNOR CHAMBERLAIN AND OTHER PROMINENT MEN OF OREGON WILL BE AT FESTIVE BOARD.

Governor Chamberlain has accepted the invitation to the Vice Presidential Banquet and a number of other prominent citizens have now already declared their intentions to be present, among whom are Senators Fulton and Bourne, Walter C. Smith, John M. Gearin, Tom Richardson, Joseph Simon, W. R. Ellis, Senator Ankeny, John F. Carroll, Col. Roessler, and H. C. Nutt.

The problem now seems most likely to be how to take care of the number of people who will want to attend, and not how to get a sufficient number of guests present. And this is in spite of the fact that there has been trouble in getting a sufficient number of people to attend banquets ever since the Biblical days when according to the parable one rich man had to send out into the highways and the byways for those who would eat his feast.

A very large number of checks of \$10 each are now rapidly coming in by mail from all of the towns of the Columbia River basin and there will be a paid delegation of 60 people from the Portland Board of Trade, Chamber of Commerce and Commercial Club alone. But as the right has been reserved to send back checks, in case more than the number is received than can be accommodated, there will still be an opportunity for Astorians to attend if they leave their check in the Chamber of Commerce headquarters this week or very early next week. So far no committee has formally gone out among the business men because it has not been necessary. And it will not be so far as numbers are concerned. In fact, as first stated, the problem will most likely be, how to accommodate those who will want to attend and not how to get attendance.

Dan Moore is rapidly completing arrangements for the culinary details and the menus and official souvenirs are being hand-painted and decorated by a prominent local artist.

AIDS PROMOTION COMMITTEE.

County Court Appropriates \$3000 for Advertising Clatsop County's Resources.

The County Court in session this afternoon, Judge Trenchard presiding, at the request of the Chamber of Commerce, made an appropriation as the law provides, of one thousand dollars, to the Promotion Committee, George W. Sambaon chairman, to be used in advertising the resources of the county of Clatsop and to provide a suitable exhibit of the county at the State Fair to be held at Salem.

Manager Whyte of the Chamber appeared before the court at its afternoon session and explained the kind of advertising the Chamber was now carrying on and outlined the plans of the campaign generally. He showed that while the city of Astoria was at the present time expending about \$1,100 per month in its publicity work, that much of this was for the benefit of the county. He explained that it was for that reason the Chamber had thought that the county might make an appropriation to assist to some slight extent in the publicity work which the city was now almost wholly bearing.

The manager cordially thanked the honorable court for its favorable consideration on behalf of the Promotion Committee and assured them that the Committee would try to make this first appropriation so valuable to the county that with next year the county might see its way clear to budget a much larger sum for advertising and publicity work.

The warrant for the appropriation was ordered drawn in favor of the Promotion Committee of the Chamber. The funds will be immediately available.

WIRELESS STATION IN ASTORIA

CITY WILL HAVE COMMERCIAL STATION—MANAGER A. V. RAGSDALE OF UNITED WIRELESS TELEGRAPH COMPANY HERE.

Manager A. V. Ragsdale of the United Wireless Telegraph Company is staying at the Occident. He has with him James O'Connor of the same company and Mr. Marriot, the superintendent of construction. These gentlemen are in town for the purpose of locating a sight for a wireless telegraph station. They have four or five places in view, and are at present figuring with the owners of the property. As will be seen by reference to the advertising columns of this paper the company is asking for bids for the erection of a 200-foot mast for the purpose of taking messages. The machinery and instruments are already shipped and are due to arrive in Astoria almost any day. The company is putting in a chain of stations all over the country and the station in Astoria will be in operation in short order. Mr. Ragsdale leaves for Portland on the early train this morning.

The Celebration at Clatskanie

The celebration of the Fourth at Clatskanie is reported as being one of the most successful of its kind held in that prosperous little city for a long time. Many were present from Missoula and as far out as the Nehalem and at 11 o'clock, when the literary exercises were held the streets were crowded with enthusiastic people. At 10 o'clock the parade commenced; this consisted of a large delegation of Modern Woodmen of America attired in full uniforms, followed by 20 volunteer firemen; behind the firemen came several floats beautifully decorated with the red, white and blue colors and in the floats were seated a score of Clatskanie's little boys and girls all dressed in white and each carrying a flag. After the parade the people gathered around the grandstand and Mr. Conyers of Clatskanie delivered a short but exceedingly appropriate address of welcome. A. Y. Anderson of this city then read the Declaration of Independence, in a masterly fashion. Howard M. Brownell of Astoria then followed as the orator of the day. This address, covering about an hour, was

an eloquent exposition of patriotism and was closely followed throughout. After the literary program the games followed and in the evening the young people took part in an enjoyable dance.

Police Court

The Fourth of July crop of drunks resulted in 15 forfeiting bail, three paying fines and five fined, but sentence suspended, since July 3rd Bertha Bureau convicted of vagrancy about a month ago was at that time sentenced to 100 days confinement. Her sentence was suspended on condition that she leave town. She recently appeared on the streets and was taken in by Officer Linville. She will probably get another "floater."

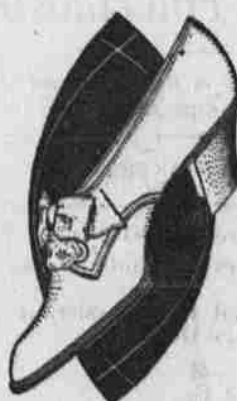
