WILL REPEAT MARCH

Attempt to March Through Georgia Commenced

MILITARY GRADUATES IN PARTY

Military Men To Traverse Route Pursued By General W. T. Sherman in 1864—Former Attempt by Son of General Failure And Escort Withdrawn.

CHATANOOGA, Tenn., July 5.—A second start was made yesterday by military men to traverse the route pursued by General W. T. Sherman when he created havoc and brought devastation through the heart of the South.

Only a year ago Father Sherman, a Jesuit priest and son of the general, essayed to follow the path of his father. He started from Fort Oglethorpe and rode as far as Cartersville. A furore was stirred up among the southerners who remembered the reality of "Marching Through Georgia." A storm arose and President Roosevelt who heard of the disturbance as far away as Washington, recalled the military escort furnished the priest.

This time the trip is being made by commissioned officers with only enough enlisted men to take care of the stock and pitch camps. There are 34 officers in this party. They are fresh from the military staff college at Leavenworth, being recent graduates.

Confederate veterans insist that the army officers should study the tactics of General Johnston as well as those of General Sherman "that they may learn something."

Major Raughton, who is in charge of the party, does not anticipate a repetition of Father Sherman's experiences.

KUROKI GIVES LUNCHEON.

Much Good Feeling Expressed And American Question Ignored.

TOKIO, July 5.—General Baron Kuroki, the Japanese imperial envoy to the Jamestown Exposition, gave a luncheon today in honor of Luke E. Wright, the American ambassador. Field Marshal Oyama, representing the army expressed himself in the most appreciative terms of the magnificent and enthusiastic reception accorded General Kuroki and his party everywhere in the United States. His phraseology was one long chain of superlatives of gratifying appreciation in which the Japanese language is peculiarly rich. Ambassador Wright made an appropriate reply and the most cordial feelings prevailed. The anti-Japanese or what is here known as the American question, was completely ignored.
