### CAPTAIN CUTS OUT COOKING

#### SKIPPER OF ALVENA ADOPTS STRENUOUS METHODS TO RE- DUCE AVOIRDUPOIS—IS SEEN AT EXERCISE DAILY.

The schooner Alvena is lying up at Westport loading lumber. That isn't what draws the crowd around the ship every morning—though! It is the spectacle of Captain Johnson going through his physical culture exercises, which nowadays gets people out of bed at cock-crow. Every morning at break of day and every evening before turning in, in very slim costume, the captain goes through his allotted task. Up the shrouds of the mizzen mast on the starboard side, down on the port, hand over hand goes Cap. Then a short sprint to the main, up the shrouds and down again. Another short sprint and up and down again, and so on to the foremast. ### WATERFRONT ITEMS

**Alesia Makes a Record Run  
From Yokohama**

**BIG LOG RAFT COMES DOWN**

G. H. Mendell on the Bat Fixing Buoys on South Channel—Henrik Ibsen, Big Norwegian, Will Come Here Soon From San Francisco.

The steamer Alliance went out yesterday morning early on her Coos Bay run, with all the freight she could carry. She had some heavy mill machinery amongst her cargo.

The steamer Alliance went out yesterday light. She had discharged her cargo up the river.

The steamer Redondo which is now on the Seattle run came in yesterday afternoon from that port. She is a vessel of about 700 tons gross.

The log raft made up by the Hammond Company at Stella ran aground while leaving the slough. It is reported in a bad position to get off. There is not a rise of more than two feet in the tide there. The tug Leggett was to have taken it down the coast. Mr. McCleod of the Hammond Company, was in Astoria yesterday to superintend matters.

The German steamship Alesia came up the river yesterday. She was flying the O. R. & N. house flag and is chartered by the Portland Asiatic Line. Captain John Ernst says he had a fine voyage over, and a record one at that, completing the trip from Yokohama in 16 days. The vessel arrived ahead of her pilot who had not started from Portland to meet her. From Hong Kong, Kobe and Yokohama she brought a general cargo.

In charge of the tow boats Henderson and Wentworth the big log-raft, made up by the Benson Logging Company at Stella came down the river yesterday. The raft, which contains 10,000,000 feet of piles, is bound for the sawmill of the Benson Company at San Diego, and it will be taken there by the tug Dauntless.

The Henrik Ibsen will come from San Francisco to the Columbia to load wheat and flour for North China. She is a vessel of 2900 tons register, can handle 7000 tons of freight, and is a Norwegian.

The tug G. H. Mendell was on the bar yesterday fixing the buoys of the South Channel according to the new chart.

With the arrival of the Oriental liner Alesia to the Columbia River from Yokohama this morning in a trifle more than 14 days, a new speed record across the Pacific by the freighters operating from this port has been established. The Alesia is the new steamer which has been substituted by the Portland & Asiatic Steamship Company to take the place of the Aragonia, and she is on her initial run to the Columbia. She left Yokohama June 28 and steamed into the harbor at Astoria at 10:15 this morning.

The exact hour of her sailing from the Japanese port is not known by the local officials of the company, but they are certain she has broken all previous records made by any other freighter ever engaged in the trans-Pacific trade from the Columbia River. In crossing the Pacific a day is gained by the steamers, which has to be added to the passage. But as she reached the river at an early hour this morning, today's run cannot be included in her voyage. She put in an appearance so much ahead of the time expected that Captain A. L. Pease, who makes it a business of piloting the Oriental liners up the river, was not at Astoria to meet her. He will leave today to pilot her to Portland.

The Alesia is bringing almost a full cargo of Oriental goods, 2000 tons of which will be forwarded direct to points in the interior. Among the shipments for local merchants are a quantity of grain bags, tea, matting, Chinese groceries and curios.

The Larline did not get down till nearly 11 o'clock last night. So heavy is the freight for her at way ports that on Saturday the Undine will come down to help her out.
