Anthracite Coal Operators are **Presumably Satisfied**

DISPUTE, LONG STANDING ONE

During the Four Years of the Commissioners Existance, 159 Differences Between the Coal Operators and Their Employers Have Been Settled.

NEW YORK, July 15 .- It is announced by the anthracite coal operators that the miners are at last presumably satisfled with the way they are being treated, and in support of this claim the fact is pointed to that at last, after four years of activity, the board of conciliation, created to settle disputes between men and employers in 1902, have at last a clean docket before them.

During the four years of the commisdivision of the board has made it necessary to refer only 27 cases to an umpire. Of the grievances considered, only one was presented by the United Mine Workers of America as a body representing all the miners. Thirteen were presented by the operators and 146 by within a few minutes of each other. the miners. By the board's decisions, 29 cases were sustained, 115 not sustained or withdrawn, and 15 settled "through the influence of the board."


