WATERFRONT ITEMS

Relief Lightship Due for the Reef

U.S. CRUISER CHARLESTON OUT

The Schooner Alvena Down With 927,000 Feet of Lumber—The Breakwater and Redondo Out, and Roanoke and Johan Poulsen In.

The Roanoke arrived in yesterday morning from San Pedro. As usual this vessel had a heavy passenger list and a fair quantity of freight.

The Lurline arrived down about 6 o'clock last evening. She brought down six horses for the Sanborn Cutting Co. to be used in seining operations.

The steamer Johan Poulsen came in yesterday from San Francisco to load lumber. She went on up the river.

The Breakwater left out yesterday morning for Coos Bay. She had all she could carry in the way of passengers and freight. The proof that a second vessel was needed on this run is ample.

The four-masted schooner Alvena came down from Westport yesterday. She had a cargo of 927,000 feet of lumber for San Francisco. Later she left out in tow of the tug Melville.

The steamer Redondo left down for Seattle yesterday. Her cargo consisted principally of whisky and various liquors. And yet the lid is on in Seattle.

In the charge of Pilot Captain Leyton the U. S. cruiser Charleston left the river yesterday afternoon, after more than two weeks' visit. As she neared the city of Astoria the band struck up a lively air, on the quarter deck, and the sailors manned ship. A truly handsome picture the vessel made as she passed swiftly by the wharves. The music from the band the crowds of jacksies and the indomitable appearance of the vessel herself all tended to send a little tremor of loyalty up the spines of the crowds gathered to bid her God-speed. And though Astorians did not get much satisfaction out of the cruiser's visit, their pride in her remains undiminished.

The Norwegian steamer Henrik Ibsen (2100 tons) should be in any time now from San Francisco.

Mail has been received here for officers of the British steamer Hyndford. Consequently it is conjectured she will be back in the river before long.

The lighthouse tender Heather will meet Secretary Oscar L. Strauss at Victoria upon his arrival there. The Heather is on the Sound at present.

The Potter had a big crowd aboard yesterday bound for the Beach. She picked up several additional passengers at Astoria.

After lying idle since June 21, when she arrived from Santa Rosalia consigned to Frank Waterhouse & Co., the British steamer Maori has been chartered to load lumber for Shanghai. It is reported the rate is \$3.75 but Captain Duncan has received no information with reference to the engagement other than instructions for loading. The fixture was made at Shanghai and for that reason little is known of the charter party. Another of the disengaged fleet, the British steamer Strathairn, which is discharging cement, is also reported fixed. She will proceed to the Sound for loading. That leaves the British ship Dalgona the only carrier not engaged or under orders to proceed elsewhere seeking business. At this season grain carriers are usually casting about for charters but since the organization of the International Shipowners' Association the establishment of a standard rate has served to retard until after the new crop of wheat is in sight, for there is no incentive for exporters to hurry in selecting their fleets for United Kingdom loading. In lumber circles the latest engagement announced in that of the steamer Lyra, now on Puget Sound, which has been taken by the Portland Lumber Company to load here for Panama.

Relief lightship 70, one of the steam vessels brought around the Horn three years ago to serve as reliefs for the craft stationed along the Coast, sailed from San Francisco Saturday to take the place of No. 67, off Umatilla reef, No. 67, will be brought to the Columbia River for repairs. Later it is planned to send No. 30, which is stationed off the Columbia, inside for an overhauling. No. 67 steams but six knots an hour and was not expected to reach the bar until yesterday afternoon. Following her stay in the north, which will be terminated early in the fall, the steamer will return to the Bay City to await orders for other work.

JUDGE BOWLBY HAS SESSION OF COUNTY COURT RETURNED

HE OBSERVED CONDITIONS AT SAN FRANCISCO—CITY IS VERY MUCH SHAKEN AND LACK OF CONFIDENCE SHOWN.

Judge Bowlby has just returned from San Francisco where he has been visiting for the past 10 days. While there he noted the conditions of that city and returns with some vivid impressions. San Francisco is as yet a city of debris and uncompleted buildings. In some parts of the city little if any change appears from the conditions following the fire. In other sections new buildings are being erected. Owing to the number of wrecks and loss of life on the coast division of the Southern Pacific Company, to Los Angeles many people fear to travel in that direction. The company has been peculiarly unfortunate with that portion of the system since its completion. Many wrecks occurring attended with loss of life and injuries. Judge Bowlby stated that conditions are very unsatisfactory in San Francisco. The city is badly shaken and a lack of confidence prevails. Buildings are being delayed in construction and the money situation is not as good as it might be. Little money is coming in for investment and many of the interior banks are changing the location of their deposits. All in all San Francisco is suffering from a blow that it will not get over for a long time. On the up trip, the Roanoke, on which steamer Judge Bowlby returned, stopped at Eureka and quite a number of passengers embarked for Oregon. In conversation Judge Bowlby learned that several were seeking investments in this section. Dairy lands, they say, were held at such high figures that as investments they were prohibitive. He enjoyed his trip thoroughly yet returned to his home city glad to be at home again.

PROBATION OFFICER APPOINTED FOR JUVENILE COURT—THE REMAINDER OF BUSINESS NEARLY ALL CONCERNED ROADS.

In the county court yesterday Judge Trenchard and Commissioner Larson presided. According to the provisions of an act passed at the last legislative session, a probation officer was appointed yesterday for Clatsop County. John Treascher of the Boys' & Girls' Aid Society was the appointee. It was further ordered that the sum of \$10 per month be paid to the Society to cover all expenses of the officer. In the matter of Road 53, two bids were received for the carrying out of the requisite improvements, one from W. J. Ingalls for \$435 and another from C. H. Hill for \$860. W. J. Ingalls' bid was accepted and he was given till October 1st to complete the work. His bond is for \$200. In the matter of Road 102, A. Borglund was awarded a contract to carry out a portion of the work at a price of 15 cents per cubic yard. He has till October 1st to complete the job. The application of W. N. Jones for a remission of the 1905 taxes on the SE 1-4 of sec. 43, T. 5 N., R. 9 W. was heard. It was ordered that he pay the tax less the penalty and interest. The road supervisors were ordered to make a report of all tools on hand by August 1st. The county clerk was ordered to advertise for bids for the improvement of Road No. 100. A warrant was ordered drawn in favor of W. C. Smith, for \$246 being a remission of the penalty and interest on taxes.
