COUNCIL IN SESSION

City Attorney Passes Opinion on Limiting Saloons

MAYOR WISE IS SUSTAINED

A Large Number of Ordinances, Petitions and Communications Were Heard—Cov Ordinances Suspended in Defined Territory—Mayor Wise Commended

The common council of the city of Astoria met last evening in an adjourned meeting of the second regular session of July. The meeting was a busy one of the usual routine nature. A timely remark to the city physician by Mayor Wise was lively indulged in. Councilman Kaboth on the part of the council expressed appreciation for the manner in which Mayor Wise handled the occasion of the Vice-President's visit to Astoria. Mr. Wise very modestly answered by saying that he was only due to a small part of the credit and that the larger part was due the citizens whose generous hospitality is always equal to any occasion.

The following resolutions were adopted: To improve Commercial street from the west line of Third to the west line of the city of Astoria; to improve Bond street (West) from a point 800 feet west of the west line of the City of Astoria to the west end of Bond street as extended; to improve Irving avenue from the center line of Sixth to the west line of Eighteenth street; to improve Melbourne avenue from a point 25 feet south of the center line of Alameda avenue to the north line of Columbia avenue; to improve Columbia avenue from a point 12 1-2 feet east of the center line of Lincoln avenue to a point 12 1-2 feet west of the center line of Melbourne avenue; to improve Eighth street from the south line of Harrison avenue to the south line of Lexington avenue; to improve Lincoln avenue from the west line of Columbia avenue to the north line of Duane street (West); to improve Astor street from the west line of Sixth street to the east line of Eighth street, except the portion of Sixth street crossing used by the Astoria Electric Co. for railway purposes; to improve Exchange street from the center line of Tenth street to the east line of Ninth street; to improve Third street from the north line of Commercial street to the right-of-way of the A. & C. R. R.

Liquor licenses were granted to C. E. Tyer and Jack Anderson. The petitions of Edward Anderson, P. A. Peterson, A. E. Papopoloplo was referred to the committee on health and police. The petition of John Hahn asking to be allowed to improve a certain portion of Commercial street abutting on his property was referred to the committee on streets and public ways. A communication from S. D. Adair and C. B. McFarland stating that they cannot consistently accept the franchise as granted them by the council on the 11th day of May, 1907 was placed on file. A communication from C. S. Gunderson in regard to a notice from the city physician to clean up certain premises which he owns was also placed on file. Here it was moved and carried that the city attorney ascertain the expenses of building, etc., of a bulkhead in the vicinity of Eleventh street to keep back the debris washed up by the tides. A communication from C. J. Trenchard, assigner of the estate of E. B. Hawes tendering \$290.10 unpaid street assessment, certain property was sold for plus interest at 6 per cent from date of sale was referred to proper committee and granted. A communication from J. A. Welch in regard to insurance on new engine house was referred to committee on public property. A communication from G. Wingate asking the city to fix a gutter on Eleventh street was referred to be streets and public ways committee. A communication from Asmus Brix declining the appointment as viewer in laying out an alley in block 38 was accepted and filed. Another from the chief of the fire department to build a hose tower 58 feet high was read and referred to the proper committee.

The ordinances appropriating to John Stephenson for \$351.22; C. G. Palmberg for \$4330, and W. A. Goodin for \$1290 were read third time and passed.

The following ordinances were read the first and second times: appropriating \$718 for the benefit of W. C. Law & Co. as full payment on their contract with the City of Astoria; to pay W. A. Goodin for work performed on Irving street from Eighteenth to Adair; to pay C. G. Palmberg part payment on his contract for the erection of the engine house.

An ordinance appropriating \$1950 for the benefit of A. G. Long. An ordinance for removing boxes, stalls, private

rooms, etc., in restaurants and saloons. An ordinance appropriating \$250 for the benefit of A. L. Stander.

In the case of the following ordinances, the rules were suspended and a third reading was had and passed: For extending the time for the completion of improvements on Alair avenue; accepting the improvement of Kensington avenue; authorizing the committee on streets and public ways to enter in a contract with E. A. Gerding for extra work on Irving avenue between center line of Sixteenth street and west line of Eighteenth street.

Action on the ordinance limiting the number of saloons was postponed indefinitely.

The report of the city auditor was referred to the committee on ways and means.

The communication from Mrs. W. A. S. Kinney enclosing \$13.05 in regard to block 66, McClure's addition, was adopted. An application for building permit from T. S. Trullinger was adopted.

The following petitions were allowed: From Axel Johanson in regard to assessment for improvement of Niagara avenue; for the improvement of Fourteenth street by the Astoria Abstract Title & Trust Co.; for an arc light at the corner of Eleventh and Duane street by W. A. Pohl and others; from Captain Pickernell asking permission to construct cement sidewalk in front of his premises at corner of Third and Bond streets.

A petition not to enforce the pound ordinance, east of Thirty-eighth street was carried.

The council accepted the bid of E. A. Gerkin of \$714 for the improvement of Irving street; and that of L. A. Carter of \$225 for the improvement of Fourth street.

The council sustained the Mayor's action in refusing to sign the warrants in favor of Goodin and ordered the warrants canceled.

In the case of limiting the number of saloons in Astoria, the city attorney rendered his opinion which was placed on file. He holds that the city has specific power to keep the saloons within certain bounds and to limit them to defined boundaries.

A motion was made and carried to advertise for bids to furnish the year's supply of hay and feed for the city's stock.

Case Dismissed—
The case of the State vs. Tovia Semelius, in which John Hannula had arrested Tovia Semelius on a charge of attempting to beat a board bill, came up before Judge Goodman yesterday, and the complaining witness failing to put in an appearance, the case was dismissed after the defendant paid the court the board money, amounting to \$15. The defendant, through his attorney, Howard M. Brownell, announced that he was innocent of any criminal intent to beat the complaining witness out of his money, and that if the matter was tried out he could prove his innocence, but that rather than put the county to the expense of calling a jury, he would pay the bill provided the case was dismissed.
