BOWLSBY RELEASED YESTERDAY

BONDS RETURNED APPROVED FROM HILLSBORO BY JUDGE McBRIDE AND BOWLSBY GOES TO PORTLAND.

J. H. Bowlsby, who shot and killed Cleve Jennings, is released and is a free man till September. He will then appear before a jury of his peers to answer to a charge of murder in the first degree. In the meantime he is free to come and go and to follow his vocation of an undertaker.

Yesterday the bond in \$2500 was received back endorsed with his approval by Judge McBride who also endorsed an order to the sheriff to release Bowlsby upon the filing of the bond.

Judge McBride's endorsement of the bond read as follows:

"The within undertaking is approved by me at Chambers this 16th day of July, 1907, and it is ordered that upon filing this undertaking with the clerk of the Circuit Court for Clatsop County, Oregon, the sheriff release said J. H. Bowlsby from custody. Dated the day and year above written.

After some deliberation as to whether the order of release was in the requisite form, of which Sheriff Pomeroy was doubtful, requiring to be assured, the sheriff telephoned the judge, and being satisfied that he was doing everything in order he released Bowlsby from the county jail about 5 o'clock yesterday.

In a conversation Bowlsby said he felt very unwell and in fact he said he feared appendicitis. He was, he said, going to Portland and afterwards to his home at North Bend. His appearance was that of a very sick man. Since being in jail he has grown a dark beard, which alters his looks considerably.

The signatories of Bowlsby's bond, who each stated that they were worth upwards of \$500 were nine in number. They were:

Note.—The last survey by the United States engineers shows these buoys are placed near the center of a channel of about one mile in width, and having a depth of nowhere less than 22 feet. The buoys mark the point at which the crest of the bar is narrowest.

Willamette River, Rock Island Channel Buoys 2 and 4, each a red third-class spar, found missing July 16, were replaced the same day.

Juan de Fuca Strait, Cape Flattery Mooring Buoy, a white first-class nun, marked "Cape Flattery" in black, found missing July 10, was replaced the same day.

Salmon Bay and Ballard Harbor, Salmon Bay entrance buoy, 2, a red second-class nun, found missing July 13, was replaced the same day.

Ship Harbor, Shannon Point buoy, 2, a red second-class nun, reported one and one-half miles to the eastward of its position, July 5, will be replaced as soon as practicable.

The pilot schooner Joseph Pulitzer went out to her moorings outside the bar yesterday morning. Captains Anderson and McVicar were aboard the

schooner, as first on the roster. The schooner has been recently overhauled and repaired and is now fit for a year.

The Harvest Queen came down about 1 o'clock this morning with the schooners Letitia and Lillebonne in tow. The latter was light and goes to San Francisco whilst the Letitia (which ran aground recently up the river) had a cargo of lumber loaded at Stella.

Notice is hereby given, that all cases of suspected contagious diseases, especially measles, must be reported by a licensed physician. There is presently one case of scarlet fever in the city and it is therefore the duty of this office to insist on immediate report of all suspected cases. As the past epidemic of measles has been such a mild form as not to warrant the strict regulations, which necessarily must be observed in the more dangerous diseases, it has been the aim and desire of this department to give the broad-winners the fullest possible liberty, consistent with the best interest of the community. As scarlet fever has appeared this liberty must now come to an end and this office speaks the assistance and good-will of the public in its efforts to confine the disease to the least possible numbers. This can only be done by reporting suspected cases through a licensed physician and by observing strict quarantine. The color of the quarantine flags marked contagious denotes the following diseases:

Red flag—Scarlet fever.
Yellow flag—Smallpox.
Green flag—Diphtheria.
White flag—Measles, whooping cough, or any other suspected disease.
