RAILWAY MEN STRIKE

Men in Repair Shops Stop Work Aggrieved.

HE WASHED UP TOO SOON

Two Hundred And Eighty Men Stop Work Demanding That Discharged Men Be Reinstated And Paid For The Time He Was Off.

CHICAGO, July 23.—The Railway Car men's Union, comprising car repairers, carpenters, painters, cleaners and laborers declared a strike yesterday against the Rock Island lines, and 280 men employed in the repair shops at Moline, Rock Island and Davenport, stopped work until one of their number is reinstated with full pay from the time he was discharged to date of reinstatement.

The men employed in the repair shops had been in the habit of being ready to leave the shops when the whistle announced time to stop work. In order to accomplish this it was necessary for them to stop work ten minutes earlier in order to wash up. The company posted rules forbidding the practice on penalty of discharge. A painter at East Moline was found washing up ten minutes before the hour for stopping work, and was discharged. He reported to the grievance committee of the union which in turn held a conference with the railroad officials, demanding the reinstatement of the discharged man with full pay for the time he was off duty. The executives were willing to give the man another chance, but refused to give him full pay for the time he was off.

ALL NIGHT COURT.

An Innovation in New York Life Commences on August 1.

NEW YORK, July 23.—The all night court, a new feature of New York life, will begin its sessions on August 1. Magistrate Whitman, who was instrumental in having the legislature create the new court, will have the honor of presiding at the opening session. The principal reforms that the new court will bring about according to Magistrate Whitman are these: First, abolition of the professional bondsmen evil; second, checking the "shakedown" by police of persons arrested at night, and third, ending the suffering of a night's imprisonment in a filthy police station cell by persons whom a magistrate may admit to bail.

COMPLETES WORK.

Harriman's Work to Control Colorado River Finished—\$1,500,000 Spent.

IMPERIAL, Cal., July 23.—Last night marked the completion of the work which E. H. Harriman, president of the Southern Pacific Company, undertook to perform to control the Colorado River at the request of President Roosevelt. During the period of operations the Southern Pacific has furnished nearly \$1,500,000 of capital for the work. Official announcement is made that the work of control is completed and that affairs at that river have been turned back into the hands of the California Development Company. Until there is an agreement between the governments of the United States and Mexico and the private corporations as to interests the work of control will rest there.

FRUIT PROTECTIVE ASSOCIATION.

Will Endeavor to Have Clause Limiting Amount of Sulphur Rescinded.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 23.—All the fruit packers of California and many fruit growers who have formed the Fruit Protective Association of California are making strong efforts to have the clause enacted limiting the quantity of sulphur used in drying fruit, rescinded. If for only the present season at least, or until the matter can be thoroughly investigated by the government. The government has sent Dr. Gould, a chemist of the Pure Food Department, who is making investigations in the northern part of California, and there is hope that the government will take such action as to save the dried fruit industry of California until the matter shall be finally determined.
