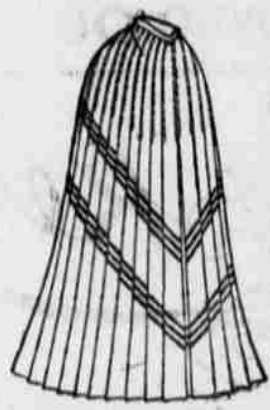

Mme. Emma Eames is making preparation for departure for Europe where she will remain for some time—will sing in "Iris," "Le Nozze" etc. . . .

NEW YORK, July 24.—Enthusiastic over the new roles she was singing next season in the Metropolitan Opera House, Mme Emma Eames is making her final preparations for her departure tomorrow afternoon for Europe where she will remain for sometime. Speaking of the operas in which she will appear, Mme Eames said:

"It has been settled that I am to sing the title role in Puccini's 'Iris' and I shall spend much of my time while in Bar Harbor, studying the opera, which I think is one of the greatest of all the Puccini operas. Mr. Caruso and Mr. Satti are going to sing with me in 'Iris'."

"Other operas in which I shall sing next season include 'Don Giovanni,' 'Le Nozze di Figaro,' and 'Otello.'"

"Of course I shall sing all the other operas in my repertoire, but I am looking forward particularly to 'Iris,' which is to have a splendid production."

Mme Eames said that her return to New York next November might be her last homecoming from Europe for a long time, as she is going to remain in her own country for all time, save perhaps when she will occasionally go abroad for a little rest.

VANDERBILT CUP RACE.

Vanderbilt Notified of Proposition Made By St. Louis Automobile Club.

NEW YORK, July 24.—A. Pardington, acting chairman of the American Automobile Association racing board, has notified W. K. Vanderbilt, Jr., by cable of the proposition made by the St. Louis Automobile Club to hold the Vanderbilt cup race in Missouri over a 30 to 40 mile course outside of that city.

What effect the holdings of the big automobile race in the West will have upon the foreign entries will not be

known until Mr. Vanderbilt has had a conference with the foreign makers who expressed their willingness to send cars to this country provided the race could be arranged near New York. If the foreign autoists are willing to make the extra trip from this city to St. Louis efforts will be made to ascertain the exact nature of the proposed racing circuit near St. Louis and Governor Folk will probably be asked to grant the state militia to guard the course.

ALCOHOL BATH FATAL.

PASADENA, Cal., July 23.—Mrs. Claude E. Markey of this city was burned to death last night in her home. She had taken an alcohol bath before retiring and put a hot iron to her feet. The alcohol fumes, accumulated under the bed clothes, became ignited and the woman was dead before help reached her.

OPIUM HAS ADVANCED.

Starting At \$3.80 Per Pound It Has Increased To \$6.50

NEW YORK, July 24.—Opium has advanced in price in the local market since the first of June to an extent that is little short of phenomenal. Starting on the date mentioned at \$3.80 a pound, duty paid, prices at first advanced gradually and lately by leaps and bounds, until the present price of \$6.50 a pound has been reported.

The advance is due to unfavorable crop condition in Turkey, the main producing section of the world. Bad weather has reduced the yield of the poppy plants and estimates of the crop have been cut down from time to time until it is now figured that the output for this season will amount to only 2000 cases. Taking this estimate as a basis, it appears that the world's visible supply until the next crop is harvested is about 4500 cases. The normal world's consumption is 6500 cases annually.

MEETING WITH CLOSED DOORS.

TOKIO, July 24.—According to a dispatch received here from Seoul this morning Marquis Ito received a long message yesterday, July 23, from the Imperial government in this city and opened negotiations with the Korean government the same evening. The Korean ministry is now holding a meeting with closed doors.

HEAT PROSTRATIONS.

CHICAGO, July 24.—Two deaths and five prostrations as a result of the excessive heat were reported yesterday in Chicago. The maximum temperature was 87 degrees.
