### ELEVATOR WAR ON

#### Civil War in Board of Trade in Chicago.

#### AN INJUNCTION WAS ISSUED

To Get the Questions Involved Before the Supreme Court Without Delay the Latter Body is Now Considering Whether it Will Temporarily Restrain Defendants.

#### ELEVATOR WAR ON

CHICAGO, July 27.—The civil war which has rent the Chicago board of Trade and resolved that organization into bitter factions for nearly a quarter of a century is said to have entered into its final campaign. Yesterday notice was received that the Supreme Court of the state will within a few days decide whether an injunction shall issue preventing the public grain warehouses of Chicago from going out of business pending the opinion of the court next October. To determine whether the railroads centering here have the legal right to allow the public to be deprived of the facility of public warehouses along their lines, which the public has enjoyed in some instances for more than a half century.

The civil war of the board of trade is commonly known as "elevator war" and now is in the hands of the supreme court for the third and presumable the last time.

"It arrived before that body upon its third visit through the medium of a chancery case begun here by the people

of the state against the Illinois Central railroad, the central Elevator Company and others, asking the court to prevent the defendants from discontinuing the business of public warehouses."

Judge Winans issued a temporary injunction which Judge Honore dissolved, presumable to permit the questions involved to get before the supreme Court without delay. The latter body is now considering whether it will temporarily restrain the defendants until the court can determine the legal issue involved.

No longer is there any doubt where the great majority of the members of the board of trade stands upon the elevator question, nor is there any half heartedness in the termination to compel the elevator men to obey the law as the courts have interpreted it, which is to compel them to confine themselves strictly to the business of public warehousemen.

#### AUTO BATTLES WITH BULL.

Bound Apart After Four Onslaughts and Machine Pursues Over Bank.

LAWRENCEBURG, Ind., July 27.—F. C. B. Seelye and a party of three women, who are traveling in an automobile from Chicago to Jamestown, Va., attempted to pass a herd of cattle yesterday, when a Durham bull attacked the machine.

The bull stopped in the middle of the road, sniffing the air, and, bellowing, he plunged into the front end of the machine. Chauffeur Seelye was unable to steer the machine out of the way on account of the other cattle, and, throwing on all of the power, attacked the bull.

He struck the large bull squarely on the head, and the animal and automobile bounded several feet apart. The attack was renewed amid the screams of the women, the shouts of the drover and the bellowing of the frightened cattle. The automobile struck the lowered head of the bull four times, and each

time rebounded as from a stone wall. The battle was ended by Chauffeur Seelye striking the animal a glancing blow, knocking it over a 10-foot embankment. The machine ran wild down the hill, and, striking the bottom, turned over the bull killing it. The occupants escaped serious injury.

#### WRIGHT MAKES ASCENSION.

PARIS, July 27.—Wilbur Wright, flying machine inventor, made a balloon ascension from St. Cloud on Friday. Mr. Wright, J. E. Harrington and another American were passengers, while Charles Levee and Alan R. Hawley acted as pilots. At the very beginning Mr. Wright had his nerve tested. At the start the wind was very fresh, 15 being required to hold the swaying balloon. For an hour the balloon hovered in the misty atmosphere, and then pierced the dark clouds into the sunshine. The descent was effected at Carpentrie. Hawley said: "Conditions at 3000 feet were perfect. The shadow of the balloon on the clouds was so clearly defined that if a passenger raised his head it was reflected."

#### HARRIMAN PACIFICS.

Animated Speculation Springing up at Dividend Period Quenched.

New York, July 27.—The stock market has been engrossed with the Harriman Pacific this week. The animated speculation which has sprung up in these with the approach of the dividend period was quenched by the definite announcement that the rate of six percent for Southern Pacific has been practically decided on.

Followers of the speculative movement became fearful that this policy argued lack of support by insiders of the market movement. The easing of the money market was in favor of stocks but doubts were felt of its long continuance owing to the approach of

the crop moving period and the advance in foreign exchange toward the gold export point. Sentiment over the metal markets and the probable extent of trade reaction remained unsettled.
