Ship Waterloo.

San Francisco dispatch says:



Are a Success and Have Been Adopted by the Union Pacific Railroad.

NEW YORK, Aug. 5 .- Satisfied with the performance of the experimental allsteel box car built at its Omaha shops, the old yards are beating former records the Union Pacific Railroad has ordered, for several years past, and the new 25 of these cars to be constructed immediately. With a capuacity of fifty cuib feet more than that of the standard Union Pacific wooden box car, the steel car weighs two tons less-37, 800 pounds. Besides affording greater safely and protection to goods in transit, the steel car requires less repairing than a wooden car, will be out of service less frequently and will therefore give more as well as better service to carrier and shipper.

A 15-inch steel 1-beam forms the center sill of the car below the double steel flooring. Actual tests have shown that the one-eight inch sheet steel forming the sides and ends of the car is stronger than the wood usually used. Tests have also developed the fact that the steel underframe of a wooden box car cannot stand up against the all-steel box car. In collision the end of a wooden car was badly damaged, while the steel car was uninjured. The doors of the steel car are formed by single sheets of steel reinforced, like the sides and ends of the car, by diagonal bracing.

The anticipated difficulties in loading and unloading and the injury that the steel sides and bottom of the car might do to contents have not been borne out by the Union Pacific's experience, as shown in the order now placed for additional cars of this type,



mans mind and the following one is worth the telling:

"One of the most independent captains in the river was Joe Tnrner, who was master of the Potter in the early days. He used to come down the river and was for all the world like one of the old time skippers of a full rigged 74-didn't care for anything. Would put on all steam and go a-flying by and in passing a little steamer or tug would not blow the whistle unless he was good and ready and in the mood.

"Well, one day he was a-steaming down and the tug Jordan was steaming up. Inspectors Edwards and Fuller were aboard the Jordan and she signalled to the Potter. Turner kept coming on down and did not reply. The inspectors kept getting madder and madder but still the Potter did not answer.

"They then ordered the Jordan to blow three signals and that stopped the Potter mighty quick and the way Edwards and Fuller went for Turner was a revelation. I don't remember exactly now but I think Turner signalled everything on the river from that time on which crossed his path."

Captain Turner was one of the best pilots that the O. R. & N. Company ever had and as one of the pioneers on the river set an example for manliness and sturdiness which has been lived up to ever since by the different masters of the T. J. Potter.
