

DEATH PENALTIES

American Revolutionists Bound by Terrible Oath.

IT WILL BE INVESTIGATED

The Central Committ Of The Society Has The Power Of Inflicting Death On Any Member—Kadarian Has Been Summoned To Tell What He Knows.

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—Evidence is forthcoming that the Hunchakist Armenian Revolutionary Society, which is being investigated by the authorities, sanctions death penalties and is an oathbound organization. County detectives recently seized papers in the room of Stephen Kadarian, an Armenian, and one of these documents appears to be the fundamental constitution of the Hunchakist adopted in 1903 and amended in 1906 at the general convention of the society held in Cairo, Egypt.

Assistant District Attorney Manley who is conducting the investigation, has had this copy of the Constitution translated and it appears from it that the central committee of the Hunchakist, which is the governing but not the supreme group of the organization, may condemn any member to death. The vote in the central committee which numbers five, must, however, be unanimous and the person thus singled out for death may appeal to the unanimous vote condemn any member to death and in such a case there is no right of appeal. Kadarian has been summoned to tell what he knows about the society and its workings.

SAILORS MAKE TANGLE.

Germany, China and This Country In Stew Over Chinese Sailors

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 6.—The case of the 24 Chinese members of the crew of the German tramp steamer Tolosan, who deserted from that vessel last Friday and have since been in charge of the federal authorities has involved this government, Germany and China in a tangle that will have to be unraveled by the representatives of the three nations in Washington, to whom the matter has been referred.

When the Chinese were taken before United States Commissioner Heacock yesterday on a charge of being illegally in this country, Ouyang King, assistant Chinese consul, said that the men were willing to be deported and would waive their right of appeal if they were returned to China on some vessel other than the Tolosan on which they had been treated cruelly. The German consul asked that the prisoners be delivered to him to be placed in the custody of the Captain of the Tolosan in accordance with immigration law and treaties. This request Commissioner Heacock denied and ordered the prisoners deported.

The Chinese consulate has wired to Washington to prevent the men being taken back on the Tolosan. The German consul has also wired an appeal from Judge Heacock's order of deportation and United States Marshal Elliot has asked Washington for definite instruction. The prisoners will be kept in the Alameda County jail until word from Washington shall have been received.

OLD DUDS TO GO

Traditional Uniforms a Nuisance, Though Picturesque.

LOBUSES AND PANCAKE CAPS

Captain Osterhaus Of Connecticut Is Appointed To Look Into Change Of Uniform And Receive Suggestions—Wants Style Like Marines.

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—The jack tars of the United States navy have made such a mighty protest against the time-honored headgear and blouse they wear ashore and on dress occasions aboard ship that to meet the clamor of the enlisted men the Navy Department has appointed a committee to decide on changes in the uniform. Captain Hugo Osterhaus, commander of the battleship Connecticut, is chairman of this committee.

Captain Osterhaus has sent out a statement to the captains of all warships in the north Atlantic squadron and to the commander of every ship in the service asking for suggestions.

The enlisted men are desirous of obtaining coats and visor caps. Many of them want the wide flaring trousers, the world-round, immemorial cut peculiar to sailor men, changed into the ordinary pattern.

But the chief grievance of the sailors relates to the blouses and the old fashioned pancake caps. These caps are said by all seamen to be absolutely useless on a windy day, as they cannot be kept on the head. They afford no shade to the eyes, and seem to exist merely as a relic of the past.

The protest over the blouse is considered well justified in the navy. In the first place the seamen object to the wide collar, which blows up around their ears on windy days. They want shorter neckerchiefs and coats cut like those of the marines.

Should the sailors' demands be granted, it would be the first time in the history of the American navy that seamen have worn coats.

CHINESE CO-EDS COMING.

SHANGHAI, Aug. 6.—Several Chinese women students have sailed for the United States on board the steamer Minnesota. They are graduates of schools in China and are going to America to enter Vassar college.
