DIES BY HIS WORK

44 Years an Engineer at Last
Killed by Locomotive.

WAS SOON TO BE PENSIONED

Banta, aged 60 Years, Run Down By An Engine—Abbott Tells Of Many People He Has Killed And Feels A Part Of His Own Engine.

CHICAGO, Aug. 6.—James A. Banta, the oldest engineer on the Illinois Central Railroad was struck by an engine and instantly killed while crossing the tracks yesterday. For 44 years Banta had driven or staked engines over the tracks on which he met his death and had survived four wrecks without injury. Banta, who was 60 years old, was struck by a train which he himself had driven for ten years. He was soon to retire on a pension.

Among the dangers that Banta survived before he met this extraordinary sort of death was the explosion of his locomotive boiler, twice running into an open switch and once falling through the cab window while the locomotive was running full speed.

Engineer George A. Abbott of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad on Sunday ran over and killed three men near Chicago, bringing his list of victims up to nearly 40 men, women and children.

Abbott, who has been 30 years in the service, related his experiences of horrors while waiting for his train to go out at the Union station.

"From a haunted, nerve-wrecked man," he said, "I seem to have become a part of the engine I drive. I probably have been the most unfortunate railroad man in the country. I cannot remember the exact number of persons that have been killed by the engines I have driven, but I should place the number between 35 and 40.

"I have driven my engine into groups of men and killed five at a time. I have seen a woman hurled as high as over the telegraph wire at the side of the track, from the front of my engine and have seen men rolled along the ties by the tender 100 feet. I have had so many harrowing experiences that I believe I have become so inured to the sight of a face distorted in death—starting at me from the wheels of my engine—that I believe I am unaffected."

FOOLS ROCK THE BOAT.

CHICAGO, Aug. 6.—A man and a woman accused of rocking a row boat in which they were rowing in Washington Park Sunday afternoon paid for their "fun" yesterday when they were fined by Municipal Judge Lantry. The woman, Mrs. Annie Finn, was fined the court costs, amounting to \$7 and the man, George Morris, was fined \$25 and costs. Both paid the fines and promised never to rock a boat again.

NEWSPAPERS LIABLE TO FINE.

Russian Editors Get Instructions To Print Nothing Concerning Emperor.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 6.—Drachinsky, the prefect of police, has issued an order notifying all editors that they render themselves liable to a fine of \$1500 of three months imprisonment by publishing without permission anything about the Emperor or the members of the Imperial family or any comments upon a trial before the rendering of the verdict. This order is inspired by fear of public criticism that might be made during the coming trial of the person accused of being implicated in last month's plot against the Emperor, the grand Duke Nicholas and Premier Stolypin.

FRENCH HOOTS AND JEERS.

PARIS, Aug. 6.—Marielin Albert, leader of the recent revolt in the Midi, who was released from jail on Friday, received a cold welcome upon his arrival at Montpellier. His late admirers reproached him for not returning sooner after his release and hooted him until he entered his house where he shut himself in.
