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## SECURES OUTFIT FOR VIKINGS

### S. L. NANTRUP RETURNS FROM PORTLAND AFTER MAKING ALL ARRANGEMENTS FOR COSTUMES OF 30 SAILORS ON VIKING SHIP.

President S. L. Nanthrup of the Norwegian Saengerfest of the Northwest, and chairman of the Viking committee of the Astoria Regatta, returned to the city Tuesday night from Portland where he went to purchase the paraphernalia necessary for the ancient Norse rites in connection with the celebration.

He reports a successful trip and has easily managed to secure suits for the sailors, who will be costumed in the style of over a thousand years ago, as well as swords, shields and numerous necessary parts of the undertaking. He will start rigging up the ship as soon as the material for it has arrived.

He has decided to have 30 sailors row the ship with huge sweeps, and according to his plans the experiment will prove a huge success in every respect. At present he is looking for the arrival of Carlo Sperati, the great chorus leader, from San Francisco, who will be here today or tomorrow.

Selection of the men who will man the ship will be made within the next few days, and it is probable that they will all be taken from expert fishermen or seamen who live in this city. It will be necessary to rehearse the Viking ship cruise in order to have no breaks on the day of the celebration—September 2—and that the plans of the committee may run smoothly.

A 60-foot boat has been secured for the Viking ship and will provide ample accommodations for a large chorus besides the numerous rowers. It is possible that on account of the boat's size that there will be a large chorus stationed on the ship, which will be led by the Viking king, and that a duet of songs will be passed from the chorus singers on a large barge to the chorus on the ship.

Every indication points toward this feature of the Regatta as being extremely unique and satisfying to those seeking a new sensation, both spectacular and edifying.

## GAMBLERS LEAVE FOR NEVADA

### MR. McCUE RECEIVES OFFICIAL NOTICE FROM HEDGES TO PROHIBIT GAMBLING AND WILL NOTIFY SHERIFF TO ISSUE ORDERS.

Deputy District Attorney John McCue yesterday received official notice from District Attorney Hedges of Oregon City to put a stop to gambling in this city on and after August 13. Mr. McCue will issue orders today through the sheriff notifying the gamblers that they are given until that date to close up their business, and he asserts that he intends to enforce the order strictly. Officers will be instructed to arrest all persons caught gambling and to confiscate all gambling devices after the prescribed date.

The order did not say anything regarding slot machines, as there is a special statute applying to these machines. The gambling was closed down under section 1944, which applies to gambling, and there may be some difficulty regarding this feature of the lid.

Six gamblers were known to have left the city last night for Nevada and it is probable that a large number of the men in the gambling business will leave for the same state during the week and after the closing date.

## HOPS IN CALIFORNIA.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., August 7.—The hop crop this year will, it is said, be about 25 per cent less than that of last year. Local dealers estimate that the entire yield of the state will not pass 80,000 bales. It is figured that Sacramento and Yolo counties will yield about 27,000 bales. Dealers, though they admit that the hops are of excellent quality this year, are offering but seven cents a pound and no sales or contracts are reported.
