The friends of Rev. and Mrs. W. S. Gilbert tendered them a surprise this week. A pleasant time was had by all.

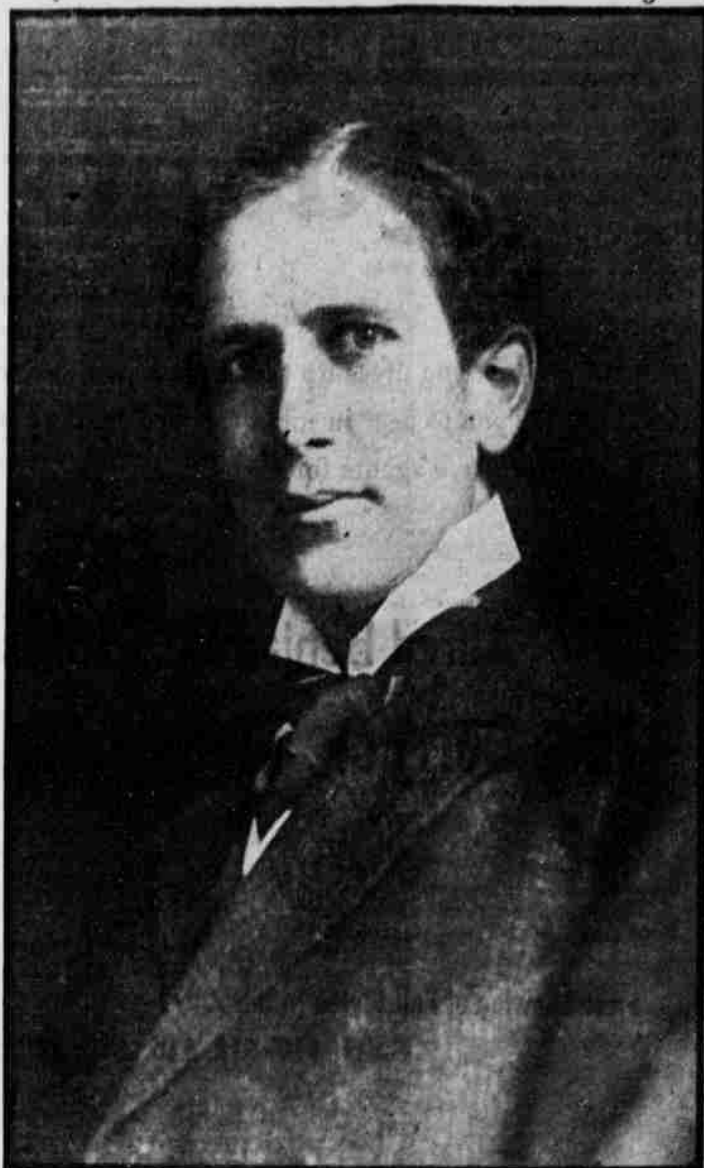

IN VOGUE.

Collure Nets For Women Who Motor. New Chain of Satin Ribbon.

Women who motor are wearing for short distance runs collure nets instead of face veils. In old fashioned novels the heroine affected wavy locks. Indeed, they were part of the outfit of sloping shoulders, fainting fits, the "vapors" and exquisite sensibility. The new woman prefers a close reefed appearance when upon her automobile. The newest in jewelry is the wearing of a black satin ribbon chain upon

bodices, and for trimming generally the same net, with motifs worked in colors, is very popular and effective.

If the home dressmaker buys some lace motifs of a heavy linen lace and works a thread of gold into the pattern, using the finest gold thread that does not tarnish, she will have something odd and pretty for her trouble.

The little coat plays an immensely important part in the remodeling of all gowns. A dainty dinner coat of Chinese blue silk is embroidered in oriental colors. Scarcely a spot in it that is not touched with the embroiderer's

which are slipped a number of diamond slides in miniature size, but set with real stones and all of fine workmanship. The ribbon is arranged double, so that there are two narrow ribbons running through each slide.

Your runabout frock of dark blue foulard can be made up to date if its long sleeves are finished with link cuffs. If not already provided you can alter the sleeve as follows: Rip the "outside" seam of sleeve from the wrist end for four or five inches. Face both sides with a strip of the same material as the frock as deep as possible. Work buttonholes on both sides of the cuff's end and insert your sleeve-buttons in a mode.

NEW COMET DISCOVERED.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 10.—Director W. W. Campbell, of Lick Observatory speaking of the new comet says:

"The faint comet discovered by Daniel, of Princeton Observatory has now become the brightest comet that northern astronomers have seen in the past fourteen years. On the summit of Mount Hamilton a splendid view of the comet

At present the comet is on the northern border of the constellation of Pric. During the next fortnight it will be passing through the southern part of Gemini. The comet should reach its maximum brightness for terrestrial observers in the latter part of August.

MAY CLEAR MYSTERY

Italian Arrested in Chicago May be Needed in New York.

ATTACKS WOMAN WITH KNIFE

De Lara Tries To Kill Mrs. Murray Who Cleans His Living Room For Not Doing The Work Properly—De Lara Is Thought To Know Of Two Murders.

CHICAGO, Aug. 10.—An attempt to murder a woman with a knife in her residence at 317 Aberdeen Street may result in clearing two murder mysteries that have remained unsolved for many years. The statement of Mrs. Mary Murray 35 years old, who was found almost unconscious on the sidewalk in front of her house, it is thought will implicate a prisoner held at the Maxwell Street station the death of a woman in Italy and that of a man in New York.

For five years Mrs. Murray has cleaned a living room of her fellow tenant, James de Lara, who owns a grocery in another part of the building. Yesterday De Lara complained that she was not doing her work properly. An argument followed and De Lara, it is charged, attacked her with a large knife. The woman was cut several times before she escaped from the house. She fainted in the street and was found by policeman O'Connell.

After receiving medical attention she made a statement to Lieutenant Thomas Coughlin, concerning her assailant. "De Lara is not his right name," Mrs. Murray told the police. "He is known in Italy as Carlos Mastelero and he is wanted in Italy for the murder of a woman. He escaped from Italy and came to New York and took the name of Charles De Lara. There he murdered a man at Canal and Front Streets, and came to Chicago. While in New York he owned the hotel Calabro and catered to immigrant Italians."

To support her statements Mrs. Murray said that De Lara, as he is known has several scars on his body received

in the fight with the man he had murdered in New York. On examination the police said they found the scars, but De Lara explained their presence by saying they were relics of a fight he had when he was in Italy.

Denial of the accusations was made by De Lara but he would not tell where he was at the time of the alleged murders. The Italian consul and the New York police have taken up the investigation.

DISGRACED BARON IS CANDIDATE.

BERLIN, Aug. 10.—It is asserted that Baron Marshall von Bieberstein, who was in disgrace ten years ago, is now a candidate for the chancellorship. The Kaiser is delighted with the high standing he has attained among the delegates of the peace conference.

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
