ASTORIA FISHERMENS TROUBLE AIRD

THE CASE OF NICK GEORGE AND HIS BOATPULLER, JEFFERSON VLACHOS, IN COURT YESTERDAY—WILL BE HARD FOUGHT.

The case of Nick George and his boatpuller, Jefferson Vlachos, who are charged with assaulting Fred Palo, came up for hearing before Judge Goodman yesterday afternoon. Vlachos is the man for whom the John Doe warrant was issued and who was arrested yesterday morning.

When the case was called Assistant District Attorney McCue appeared for the prosecution and Attorney J. H. Smith who has been retained by the friends of Palo, appeared as associate counsel for Palo. G. C. Fulton appeared for the defendant George, and Vlachos was not represented by counsel.

Statements of the case were made by both sides and by mutual consent it was decided to postpone the cases until a later date which will be determined by Judge Goodman. It being near the end of the fishing season and all of the witnesses being fishermen it was thought a hardship would be worked if the matter was taken up at once and as the ends of justice could be subserved by holding the men under \$150 bond which was immediately given with Wm. Tallant as surety. In the case of the boatpuller, Vlachos, the charge placed was assault and battery and Attorney Fulton though not directly representing the latter made a strong plea for his release on small bail but the justice and assistant district attorney desired to further investigate his case before the amount of bail was determined so Vlachos was committed to the custody of the sheriff pending such investigation.

Quite a large number of fishermen were in attendance and considerable interest was shown and there is no doubt but that the case will be hardly fought.

WATERFRONT ITEMS

The Kansas City and Lawton Will
Soon be in Service.

SHIPS ARE NEEDED FOR TRADE

Lurline Gets Down on Time as Guessed
by Employe—Della Enters From Down
the Coast—Other Items from the Shore
Line—O. R. & N. Improvements.

It was officially announced through the O. R. & N. office here yesterday that the Portland & San Francisco Steamship Company had purchased the steamer Kansas City, which is now on the Atlantic seaboard, and that as soon as she could be brought around she would be put on the run made vacant by the loss of the company. It was also announced that the steamer Lawton is undergoing repairs at San Francisco but would shortly be on the run.

"The office in Portland advised me to state to the public concerning the steamers that are soon to be placed on the run," said G. W. Roberts, the local agent of the company. "The Kansas City has been bought by the company but is on the Atlantic coast at the present time but leaves at once for San Francisco where she will touch before coming on to Portland. This steamer is larger than the Columbia and more modern in every particular."

"The other steamer that the company will use on the run is the Lawton and the office in Portland informed me that she will begin her run shortly."

The Kansas City is an iron ship of 3679 gross tonnage. Her net tonnage is 2163. She was built in Chester, Penn., and her home port is Savannah, Ga. Her length is 327 feet, beam 45 feet and depth of hold 18.8 feet. She carries a crew of 60, and her engines are of 4000 estimated horsepower.

The Lurline arrived in last night at 8:20 and by a strange coincidence that was the time posted on the dock bulletin board for her arrival. Ed Donnelly, who is Agent Blessing's assistant, had been answering questions down at the dock and in the office over the telephone all day concerning the time of the boat's arrival but as the telegraph strike was working overtime the progress of the boat down the river had not been learned and no definite time could be ascribed for her appearance.

For the hundredth time the office was phoned concerning the arrival of the boat.

"I don't know what to tell these people," said Mr. Blessing, "and we can't get Rainer to find out her time."

"Well, I guess that I will have to guess it," remarked Mr. Donnelly as he got out a piece of paper and a blue marking pencil. Just what process he went through to bring the boat in on time is a mystery. But he wrote down "8:20" and posted it up. He was asked no more questions, except those that came by phone, which were all attended to pleasantly.

When the smoke from the Lurline's funnel was sighted well up the river it was a race with time and the men on the dock began to make bets concerning how she would hit the time. When Captain Larkins came ashore he was asked what time he got in. "We pulled in at 8:20," he replied. That clinched matters and now Ed Donnelly is considered the prophet of the waterfront.

The Lurline took up last night besides a general cargo a carload of Bohemian beer in kegs and a big shipment of bottled beer for Portland.

The gasoline schooner Della entered at the custom house yesterday from Nacotta Bay. She brought up 52 cases of cheese.

Around the O. R. & N. office yesterday there was a general air of brightness; everything looked bright and cheerful, more so than usual. There was light in the office and out in the dock. All the men at work were in a happy frame of mind and the pictures on the wall of big ships madly plunging over mountainous seas reflected back the cheerful greeting.

But there had been no pay day; no increase in salary; no free tickets to the theater. Nothing like it. The windows had been washed!
