

TAKE TO FARMING

Denver Women Believe More Chances in Country.

GET GOOD IRRIGATION LAND

Miss Owens With Other Young Ladies Will Change City Life For That Of The Country And Expect To Make Fortunes—All Are Enthusiastic.

DENVER, Aug. 19.—A new departure has been discovered for Colorado's "new woman," and it is believed that it will prove profitable, instructing and interesting. A club of young women here, who will take up land in the Little Snake River Valley, in Routt county Colorado when it is opened next month is being formed by Miss Ruth Owens of 1648 Williams street. These young women have planned to take up tracts varying in size from 40 to 160 acres and will engage actively in farming the lands as soon as the big \$350,000 canal system is completed. The Little Snake River Valley is to be thrown open by the Land Board on September 5 under the Carey Act. At her residence yesterday Miss Owens said: "I do not care to say who is going with me, but we want to take between us two full sections of 640 acres each. While we expect to encounter some hardships in getting started, yet we all believe that on account of the fast diminishing supply of good irrigated

lands our farms will make us all rich. "Opportunities for young women in the city are limited, whereas the farmers in the established irrigated districts in Northern Colorado and other parts of the west have all made money, and I do not see why energetic young women shouldn't be able to do just as well. "It is our plan, after we get our land broken up, to seed it in alfalfa and wheat and we expect to take up either cattle or sheep raising as an adjunct to farming. "There is a free government range adjoining this tract which is to be opened by the State, and from the experience and observation that I have made in the other districts in Colorado I think this will be an admirable combination for the Little Snake River Valley."

WATERFRONT ITEMS

City of Panama Arrives With Cargo and Big Passenger List.

SALT FOR SALMON PACKERS

French Bark Vincennes Which Was Aground in Floated and Proceeds on up the River—Other Notes of Interest Along the Waterfront.

The City of Panama arrived in last night from San Francisco and tied up at her dock about 8:15. The Panama brought up a full passenger list. It was so large that all could not obtain cabin passage and had to sleep wherever they could be accommodated. The ship was crowded but the inconvenience was born with throughout the entire voyage as the ship's officers did all in their power to make things pleasant for their passengers. People who got off the ship here at Astoria and walked around the town while the cargo was being discharged were loud in their praise of the courteous treatment which they received from Captain Nelson and his officers and crew.

The Panama brought up a large cargo and was here most of the night discharging. She got ashore about 100 tons. The Astoria consignments consisted of salt for the canneries and salmon packers. The other part of her cargo was California fruits for the merchants and merchandise.

Yesterday was pay-day for the members of the crew of the North Star and the employes of the Alaska Fishermen's Packing Company who have just returned from their summer's work in Alaskan waters. Many of the men who returned on the North Star went out yesterday for work before the season closes here. They made about half of what they usually make in the northern waters and intend fishing every possible day they can. Secretary Noonin of the company, who was engaged in paying the men off, said that a number did not call for their money yesterday so anxious were they to get out on the river and fish.

Captain El Sullivan, of the T. J. Potter brought down word yesterday that the Vincennes, which went aground near Warrior Rock last Thursday, was cleared yesterday by the Harvest Queen and taken on up to Portland to discharge cargo. The channel at this point is shallow and the Vincennes, being well loaded, went aground on the sands.

The gasoline schooner Della arrived in Saturday night from Nestucca with a load of cheese and other merchandise.

The T. J. Potter arrived down last night at 4:15 with 200 passengers for North Beach points. This is the best Monday crowd the big steamer has brought down this season.

The Sue H. Elmore left out this morning at 3 o'clock with a large cargo of freight for Tillamook. She also had her full passenger list of visitors for the Tillamook Fair and Carnival.

The steamer Caseo, loaded with railroad ties, cleared Sunday from Portland. Her destination is San Francisco.

The schooner Gerald C. entered Sunday from Siletz to Astoria with a general cargo.

The steamer North Star, Captain Peterson, entered at the customs Sunday from Nushagak to Astoria.

The steamer Sue H. Elmore entered at the customs yesterday from Tillamook. She brought up a general cargo and a number of passengers.

The Sue H. Elmore will make special trips for the Tillamook Fair and Carnival. Commencing with this morning she will make daily trip until Thursday when she will lay over and return on her regular schedule. This change is made in her dates of leaving to accommodate the many who want to go down the coast for the fair.

The Lurline arrive down last night at 10:30 with a big cargo for the canneries. She stopped at her dock before going on down the river at the canneries and set of her passengers. On the up-trip she took up a full passenger list and there were many who had to sleep on the couches in the salon.
