Tonight will be the last night of fishing and then the season closes. Yesterday's receipts at the canneries from below were a little better than the days of last week. From up the river the returns were not so good and showed a continued falling off. It is too late now to expect anything and the whole season was a disappointment. Several fishermen have already left Astoria and others are packing up their gear, etc.

The mortgage was for \$5000 and the note for which it was given fell due in June but has not been paid. The property covered by the mortgage is in Portland, Astoria and Seaside. The Astoria and Seaside stores were closed some time ago by the sheriff but a representative of the mortgagee afterward took charge.

WATERFRONT ITEMS

Numantia Arrived in With Large Cargo.

BRINGS 30,000 CASES OF TEA

Queen Alexandra Arrives in With Portland For Her Destination—Steam Schooner Excelsior Clears For San Francisco With Lumber Cargo—Notes.

The Numantia, from Hong Kong via Yokohama, arrived in yesterday afternoon and proceeded on up the river to Portland. This steamer is one of the Portland & Asiatic line, of which G. W. Roberts, of the O. R. & N. Co., is agent, and she brings in a record-breaking cargo on this trip. Among the many things in her hold is 30,000 cases of tea, many tons of hemp and matting, great quantities of sulphur and camphor besides consignments of curios and porcelain wares.

The City of Panama left out yesterday morning for San Francisco with a full passenger list and a big cargo of freight.

The Breakwater, Captain McGeehan, from Coos Bay points, arrived in last night at 8 o'clock and touched at the O. R. & N. dock on her way to Portland.

The Queen Alexandra, from Sanarang, Java, entered yesterday for Portland. She came by way of Vancouver, B. C.

Loaded with 550,000 feet of lumber the steam schooner Excelsior cleared yesterday for San Francisco.

The schooner Beulah loaded with 402,000 feet of lumber which she took on at the Tongue Point mill sailed yesterday for San Francisco.

The oil steamer Catana arrived in yesterday from San Francisco and proceeded on up the river to Portland.

The steamer Francis H. Leggett, of San Francisco, was reported outside last night. She was prevented from coming immediately in by the fog which has been very thick outside for the past few days. Mariners coming up the coast report the fog to be especially thick all the way up from Coos Bay.

The Leggett comes up to take down the log raft which was brought down the river the other day from Stella.

The Gerald C. left out last night for Siletz with a general cargo and passengers.

Secretary of War Taft will be in Portland, September 6th and will make a public address on that date. For this occasion the Astoria & Columbia River road has made a reduced rate of one and one-third fare for the round trip; tickets being sold on September 5th and 6th with return limit September 7th. 8-24-tf.

Moonlight Picnic—
A moonlight excursion was given last night by the Presbyterian Church that was largely attended. The steamer R. Miller carried the jolly party to Knappa-ton and returned at a seasonable hour. A good time was had by all.

Asks For Rebate—

Jas. W. Welch has filed a petition with the city auditor addressed to the city council in which he asks for a rebate of \$56.12 on street assessment paid. Mr. Welch recites that on December 30, 1904, he paid to the city treasurer \$402.08 on account of the street assessment for Grand avenue from the west line of Shively's to Seventeenth street. Inasmuch as the city council is accepting the amounts of the original assessments at this day he figures that the interest on his money which the city has had since the date mentioned amounts to the sum asked for. The matter will be taken up at the next meeting of the council.

Condemnation Suits—

Judge Bowlsby, acting as attorney for the Portland Seacoast Railway Company, has commenced five suits in the circuit court to condemn a right-of-way 200 feet wide for a railroad up the Lewis and Clark River. The company proposes to construct and operate a branch line of railroad to the Nehalem River a distance of about 34 miles to connect with its proposed road from Portland. All the tenders made to owners of the property sought to be condemned have been declined and the complainant asks that the court fix the amount of compensation to be paid and the land appropriated for the use of the plaintiff. The complainant in the suits is the company organized by Wm. Reid who built the railroad between Young's Bay and Seaside.

AGRARIAN REVOLTERS PARDONED.

BUCHAREST, August 23.—King Charles today granted amnesty to all participants in the recent agrarian revolts and except the 200 priests and those sentenced for murder all were released.

Plans for the Regatta and County Fair Complete in Every Way.
