"It is fortunate at this time that Mr. Root is secretary of state. I think it is fortunate for us at all times that he is secretary of state, but now especially we need just this man of cool fearlessness. A good many men have written about the late John Hay as a great secretary of state, but it is no injustice to his memory to say that he did not have the material in him to make as efficient a public servant as Mr. Root.
