YESTERDAY IN POLICE COURT

BUSIEST SESSION FOR LONG TIME—SOLICITING WITHOUT LICENSE—RESISTING AN OFFICER—USUAL DRUNKS.

Sam Schnitzer and S. Steinberg were arrested yesterday for soliciting without a license. These men were purchasing junk, ignorant of the fact of the license fee of \$50 for the carrying on of such business. They pleaded guilty and informed the court of their ignorance of the law promising to take out licenses before proceeding with business. They were fined \$5 each.

Oscar Erikson was before the court charged with resisting an officer. Officers Houghton and Stark were arresting two men and were taking them to the city hall on the street car. When the car reached Sixteenth street and the officers attempted to take the men off the car one of them refused to accompany Houghton. Erikson, who was a friend of the arrested man, interfered with the officer and was so persistent that he was taken in charge and escorted to jail. As Erikson saw his friend being locked up he again attacked the officers, nearly putting out Liverpool Jack who had come to their assistance. He does not speak English and it was necessary to use the services of an interpreter. He was fined \$10. A boy who has been violating the curfew ordinance was also in the dock. This young man who has a good home, has been in the habit of staying out late at night and by telling saloonmen that he was of age endeavored to buy liquor. Judge Anderson read a good lecture to the culprit and fined him \$20 with an alternative of 10 days in jail. In order to give him an opportunity to profit by the good advice given in the lecture the sentence was suspended pending a mending of his ways by the young man.

One drunk was sentenced to two days in jail, one drunk and one drunk and disorderly forfeited bail amounting to \$15. Altogether the session was the busiest held in quite a while.

Oysters And Macaroni.

If you have never served oysters and macaroni, do try this recipe just as soon as an opportunity affords itself. It is such a tempting hot dish to serve with cold sliced meat, or it may be well introduced into any simple home luncheon or supper. It is an excellent way to make use of a pint of oysters if one has not a larger supply on hand. If people were more careful in cleaning oysters there would be less discomfort in eating dishes made from them. Put

oysters in a strainer placed over a bowl. Pour cold water over oysters, allowing one half cupful to each quart of oysters. Carefully pick over oysters, taking each one separately in the fingers, to remove any particles of the shell which adhere to the tough muscle. Cook three fourths of a cupful of macaroni, broken in one-inch pieces, in salted boiling water until soft; drain, and rinse with cold water. Put a layer in the bottom of a buttered baking dish, cover with oysters sprinkle with salt and pepper, dredge with flour and dot over two and one half tablespoonsful of butter; repeat and cover with half cupful of buttered cracker crumbs. Bake twenty minutes in a hot oven.—Woman's Home Companion for September.
