#### SUBJECT TO JEALOUS ATTACK.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 30.—J. F. McClure, a clerk living at 761 Turk street, was badly beaten up by two men on Franklin street near Elm avenue about 6:35 o'clock this morning.

McClure was walking along in company with a young lady when two men suddenly jumped out upon him from a doorway and immediately proceeded to pummel him with their fists. McClure defended himself as best he could, but was powerless against the force of his two assailants, and he was soon beaten to the ground. The young woman who tried to protect her escort, was roughly handled.

When he was prostrate the men proceeded to kick him and call him all sorts of vile epithets. After his assailants had fled, McClure, with the help of the young lady, who would not give her name, made his way to the Central Emergency hospital where he was treated for badly lacerated wounds of the face, head and eyes, and several body bruises.

The young man accounts for his assault by saying that it was caused by jealousy on the part of one of the two men who beat him. He says one of them is very much in love with the young lady who was his companion at the time of the assault, and although McClure does not know the name of the man he will swear out a "John Doe" warrant for his arrest.
