WATERFRONT ITEMS

Light House Tender Heather Arrives in From Sound.

LEFT SUPPLIES AT STATIONS

Considerable Work Done by the Government on Her Northern Voyage—The City of Panama Arrives in From San Francisco—Other Important Notes.

The United States lighthouse tender Heather, Captain P. J. Byrnes, arrived in yesterday from a three weeks' cruise on the Sound where she was employed in distributing supplies to the 25 or 30 stations in that district.

Between her dock and the buoy depot will be a welcome sight along the waterfront for a while any way.

While away the Heather experienced an uneventful trip with the exception that she was busy every day and from the number of stations visited and the time taken to do it in made a remarkable quick voyage.

While on the Sound the Heather received a visit from Brigadier-General Murray, U. S. A., Lieutenant-Commander Wood, U. S. N., and Captain Werlich, of the lighthouse service, and Captain Byrnes took the officers for a cruise to the different strategic points on the Sound waters for a two days' inspection tour.

Just how long the Heather will be in port is not known by her officers but she will be busy here for a few days at least attending to buoy work and other details of the local station.

The steamer Nome City was among the clearances at the custom house yesterday. She was loaded with 900,000 feet of railroad ties which were consigned to Redondo.

The steamer Alliance, Captain Olsen, arrived in yesterday from Coos Bay with general cargo and a full list of passengers.

The schooner Salvatore entered the customs yesterday from San Francisco to Astoria. She will load lumber for return.

The City of Panama, Captain Nelson, arrived in yesterday from San Francisco with freight and passengers for Portland.

The Gerald C. left yesterday for Siltz with cannery supplies for the stations there.

The Della, Captain Jones, was reported to have left last night for Nestucca Bay with general freight.

The Sue H. Elmore, Captain Schrader, was well loaded yesterday with supplies for the canneries of Elmore & Company at Yaquina Bay and Umpqua River. She expected to clear early this morning.

The Alice McDonald, with 600,000 feet of lumber on board, was towed to sea yesterday and sailed for San Francisco. The Lurline arrived down last night with her regular cargo of freight and passengers.

Standard Oil barge 91 was towed up the river yesterday with oil cargo for Portland.

The British steamer "Ferdene" reports, September 7th, in latitude N. 31 degrees 9 minutes long. W. 118 degrees 38 minutes sighting a large log about 100 feet long and dangerous to navigation.

WORKMEN TORTURE COMRADE.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—Henry Perry, a mill worker, is dying from treatment received at the hands of fellow-employees at the Tyler Tube and Pipe Company's works.

He was fastened to an iron crane and swung above the flame of a big blast furnace, which is approached by the workmen only when covered by a shield. The cords which bound Perry to the crane hook were burned through, and the unconscious form of the man dropped to the floor just in front of the furnace doors. His flesh was shriveled and his clothing charred.

Warrants have been issued for the arrest of the workmen taking part in the affair.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

Captain V. L. Cottman, U. S. Navy, reports that the mooring buoys off the Bremerton station, Puget Sound, are now located on a line running East true (ENE. mag.) through the smoke stack of the power house on the Coaling Plant wharf, and are numbered consecutively from east to west.

Vessels mooring will unshackle the chain from the side of the buoy and take it through the hawse pipe and will not make fast to the buoy shackle except temporarily.

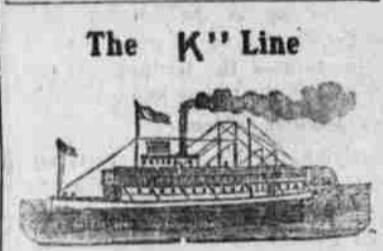
