But said San Francisco and Portland Steamship Company does not insure cargoes shipped from San Francisco to Astoria and in case of shipwreck Astoria shippers must incur the total loss or insure their cargoes through individual policies. The members of the Chamber of Commerce hold this to be a discrimination and respectfully submit matter to you."
