EAGLES IN SEATTLE NEXT YEAR

BIG CONVENTION CLOSES AT NORFOLK WITH PROMINENT LEGISLATORS AMONG LEADING GRAND OFFICIALS OF BIG ORGANIZATION

Astoria Eagles will be interested in the report of the annual election of officers of Eagles, held at Norfolk, Va., a few days ago, when among the grand officers elected were several prominent legislators. Vice-President B. J. Monaghan, of Philadelphia, is a state senator of Pennsylvania, and President Theodore A. Bell is a California congressman. The Norfolk Virginia-Pilot has the following to say of the grand lodge meeting on September 7:

"The Administration ticket won out in yesterday's election of the grand officers of the Fraternal Order of Eagles, and while the official vote will not be announced until today on the floor of the convention, it was authentically stated last night that the full ticket without a break will go through against the anti-administration at odds of ten to one.

J. S. Barry, campaign manager for Theodore A. Bell, of California, announced the following as being the new officers for the ensuing year:

- Theodore A. Bell, grand worthy president, of California.
- Bernard J. Monaghan, grand worthy vice-president, of Philadelphia.
- John A. Cline, grand worthy chaplain, of Cleveland, O.
- Conrad H. Mann, grand secretary, of Milwaukee.
- Frank E. Hering, grand treasurer.
- Edward M. McBride, grand worthy conductor, of Buffalo.
- R. L. Armstrong, grand inside guard, Texas.
- Grand Trustees—Thomas C. Hayes, Martin J. Gray, D. N. Barrett, and W. C. McKinney.

S. B. Wadsworth, of Iowa, who was first nominee for grand worthy president, and then a candidate for grand worthy vice-president, finally withdrew altogether, leaving Bell and Monaghan undisputed candidates for the race.

Seattle, Wash., was chosen as the next place of meeting without the least opposition. Harry J. Lea, of Seattle, who is chairman of the press committee, has done all that has been done, to insure the convention going to that place. The 1909 convention has been bid for by San Francisco.

POSTOFFICE FORCE INCREASED

WASHINGTON MAKES ALLOWANCE FOR INCREASE IN WORK OF THE LOCAL OFFICE BY PROVIDING FUNDS FOR ADDITIONAL MAN.

An additional clerk with a salary of \$600 a year has been allowed the local postoffice by the Washington headquarters. Postmaster Hahn received word from the department yesterday regarding the granting of his request for additional help.

The weighing of mail has been a feature of the office work which has seriously interfered with the service, as every person who has applied for mail at the general delivery wicket well knows. The allowance made for another clerk, therefore, will be a great boon both to the public and the post-office force.

The mail at the local office has been increasing in great strides during the past few months. From the receipts during July and August this fact is very evident, and there appears to be more business in the city than in former years. The correspondence from the help wanted portion of the Chamber of Commerce work has increased the sale of stamps considerably, and numerous replies from eastern people looking for positions have been received.

CHAMBER COMMERCE REGULAR SESSION

AMONG MATTERS TO BE CONSIDERED IS NOW TO GET OUT MAP OF THE CITY—ALL INTERESTED PARTIES SHOULD BE PRESENT.

The Chamber of Commerce will hold its regular session tomorrow night and among the various matters to be considered will be the problem of how to get out a map of the city that will be practically accurate. A large real estate firm that has undertaken this task has found that the different surveys of plats do not correspond by many feet and now that there seems to be a general movement opening in real estate it is more than important that this subject should be given careful consideration, for the convenience of both sellers and buyers and for the purpose of avoiding any litigation.

City Surveyor Tee has given the matter some consideration and Judge F. J. Taylor, chairman of the judiciary committee of the Chamber of Commerce will discuss the problem at tomorrow night's meeting. Any and all interested parties are requested to be present that they may throw as much light on the subject as possible.

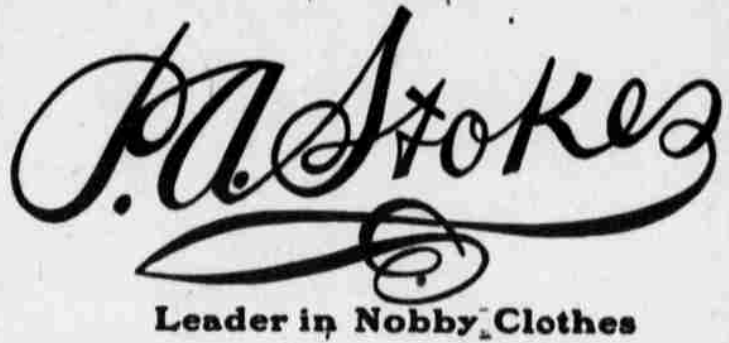
