TALE OF WILD DAYS

Deputy Marshal Formerly Famous Bandit Hunter.

ROMANTIC CAREER IN PAST

Chris Madsen, Crack Pistol Shot of "Woolly" Days, Rough Rider and War Veteran, Now Leads Prosaic Existence in Oklahoma.

GUTHRIE, O. T., Sept. 17.—This is a chapter from the story of Chris Madsen, best pistol shot and quartermaster sergeant of the Fifth cavalry in the Northwest, quartermaster sergeant of the Rough Riders during the Spanish-American war, and now chief deputy under United States Marshal John Abernathy, of Oklahoma.

Following the breaking up of the James gang in Missouri and on the Kansas border, remnants of the band went still further west into the Rocky mountains and many of them remained in the old line of business, holding up stage coaches in particular, for a number of years. The Fifth cavalry at this time was putting in a number of coaches over the mountains, and in particular the stage line to Cheyenne. Upon Eagle Pass the stage coaches met and at the hour of meeting there was as a rule, a party of United States troopers somewhere in the vicinity to guard them.

A leader of the James gang remnant for several years was known as the "Man with the Golden Tooth." With several of his boldest followers he had planned a double hold-up on Eagle pass, figuring to hold up and rob the first coach that arrived, and then complete their job when the one from Cheyenne put in its appearance. On this particular coach were a party of mining prospectors, supposed to have with them plenty of gold, taking it back to the states.

On this particular day Sergeant Brule, a companion of Madsen in the Fifth cavalry, was ordered out with two men to guard the Eagle pass. They were sheltered behind some boulders just below the level of the pass, when they discovered the bandit gang on the other side. The troopers were but three against eight or ten of the bandits. Brule determined to await the arrival of the first stage and see what would happen.

There was only a short wait and the horses had been halted but an instant on the pass, when the bandits surrounded the coach and with cool daring ordered the driver and the passengers to hold up their hands. As the order was given, however, a bullet from Sergeant Brule's rifle winged the "Man with the Golden Tooth," and each of Brule's companions picked off a man as the three troopers climbed over the rocks onto the highway. Seeing the blue coats of the troopers, the other bandits fled, leaving the "Man with the Golden Tooth" and two others of their companions dead.

Following the death of their leader the other members of the gang were captured by troopers and turned over to the Wyoming authorities. They were placed in the state penitentiary, but later escaped by locking the warden behind the bars and stealing all the guns and ammunition. Sergeant Chris Madsen was given command of a squad to trail and recapture them.

Madsen took with him a one-eyed, half-breed Indian, St. Clair by name, who had made a reputation as a guide and scout, and Jim McAdams, a long-time scout and Indian fighter. After following the trail for several days Madsen and his two comrades finally came upon the outlaw camp early one morning. The outlaws outnumbered the troopers, but McAdams broke into the camp with a shout and an order for the bandits to throw up their hands. Immediately Madsen followed him through the underbrush and after him came St. Clair, the Indian.

Believing an entire company of troopers were after them, the outlaws quickly surrendered and were all handcuffed by McAdams before they were aware that their pursuers were so few in number. The leader of the bandits was then very angry and taunted St. Clair in particular, offering to fight him under any conditions. St. Clair threw down all his weapons and asked Madsen to loosen the leader in order that they might fight it out with their fists, but Madsen would not hear of it and the bandits were soon behind prison bars again. All of them were afterwards sentenced for long terms in prison.

Madsen served 20 years in the regular army, and after that was a deputy marshal in the West, serving under General Joseph Shelby when he was United States marshal of the western district of Missouri and still later under United States Marshal Cremschaw.

Following the opening of Oklahoma to settlement in 1889, Madsen was on the force of William Grimes, United States marshal for the territory. A band of desperadoes had been terrorizing the southwest part of the territory and accompanied by Madsen and

several other deputies Grimes started after them.

Grimes was separated from the rest of the posse and in riding over the brink of a hill he saw the outlaws on ahead of him, and urged his horse to top speed to catch up with them. The horse proved unruly and placed Grimes in a position where the outlaws had him at their mercy. The leader of the band raised his pistol to fire upon Grimes at close range.

Just then Madsen rode over the crest of the hill in Grimes' path and seeing the predicament in which Grimes was placed, Madsen also urged his horse forward and while the animal was at speed, fired his rifle and winged the man that had the drop on Grimes. Grimes afterward declared it to be the best shot he had ever witnessed, Madsen being several hundred yards distant when he fired.

After the Rough Rider regiment was mustered out at Montauk Point, Madsen returned to Oklahoma and was re-appointed to a place on the United States marshal's force. When Ben F. Colbert, the Chickasaw-Choctaw Indian Rough Rider, was made marshal for the southern district of Indian Territory, he received word from President Roosevelt to give Madsen any place he might ask for, and later when John R. Abernathy, the wolf-hunter, became United States marshal for Oklahoma, Madsen was transferred to Guthrie as his chief deputy.
