RUSH MADE FOR TRIP TO ALASKA

NUMEROUS APPLICANTS FOR WORK ON DEVELOPMENT OF GUGGENHEIM INTERESTS AT KATTALLA—FIRST CROWD GOES SEPT. 23.

The employment office opened by the Kattalla & Northwestern Railroad Co. of Southern Alaska, at 279 West Bond street, in charge of Harry Lord, has been taking care of a large number of applicants since its inception several days ago. The men are coming at a rate which will warrant a large shipment to Seattle on September 23, from where they will be taken to Kattalla.

The wide range of jobs open to men of all trades, or no trades at all, just as they please, is enabling many of the fishermen, lumber camp men, carpenters, contract men, sawmill, and railroad laborers and operators, to signify their willingness to go to Alaska, the wages being from \$4 a day and up, according to the style of work.

The railroad is opening up a big copper district for the Guggenheims, who are backing the building of a seaport, a three mile breakwater, a five hundred-mile railroad, the erection of numerous sawmills and camps, and the thousand and one things necessary for the opening up and making civilized a huge tract of rich districts in mineral and timber.

The mildness of the climate enables the men to work all the year around. The seaport is open all winter and the men can come or go any time they wish, two or three ships a week passing in and out of the harbor for Seattle and San Francisco.

From the number of applicants at the office there are indications that there will be few idle men in this district during the fall and winter.

WATERFRONT ITEMS FOREIGN ANSWERS

Sailing Ships Making Unusually Long Trips.

DIFFICULTY AROUND HORN

Portion of Wrecked Schooner Bessie K. Was Again Sighted the Other Day by Captain Jones of the Gasoline Boat Della.

Sailing vessels are making unusually long passages from Europe this year, none coming anywhere near touching the record mark reported. The British ship Mosambique arrived on Puget Sound from Antwerp yesterday, after a passage of 197 days. She had been placed on the overdue list, and reinsurance on her had been quoted at 10 per cent. Naturally fears for her safety have long been felt since the average passage from Antwerp is about 140 days. Every ship to arrive in Astoria in the last two months had exceptional difficulty in getting around Cape Horn, one of them passing about half the voyage in that locality. But the Glenelvan, now at Valparaiso, will escape going through that stretch of sea, and will probably arrive on schedule. It is practically certain that the Ostara is being delayed rounding the Horn, or she would have arrived at Santa Rosalia several weeks ago.

What is believed to be a portion of the wrecked gasoline schooner Bessie K, which has been drifting off the Oregon Coast for the best part of a year, was again sighted the other day by Captain Jones, of the gasoline schooner Della, which has reached the Columbia River from Nestucca. The derelict was sighted three miles southwest of Cape Meares light. It was about 40 feet long and consisted of the bow, timbers and planking up to the water line of what apparently was the unfortunate craft. The hulk was about four feet above the water.

The Santa Rita, an oil tank steamer, arrived down the river from Portland last night, and will leave for San Francisco at high tide this morning.

The steam schooner Cascade, from San Francisco, arrived in the harbor yesterday to load lumber.

The Norwegian steamer Elsa, from San Francisco, arrived at Astoria yesterday in ballast and left for Portland.

The oil tank steamer George Loomis, arrived in Astoria harbor yesterday with 2000 barrels of gasoline for Portland, from San Francisco.

The steamer George R. Vosberg arrived in from the Nehalem last evening with a general cargo.

The gasoline boat Evie, came in from Tillamook last night.

The oil tank steamer Porter left for San Francisco yesterday.

SEATTLE, Sept. 18.—Up to a late hour this afternoon, there was absolutely no confirmation of the rumored loss of a vessel and the drowning of 300 Chinese at Bristol Bay, Alaska.

SINK SHIP TO SAVE IT.

To sink a ship, and that by means of a submarine torpedo, in order to save it, is one of the strangest of marine experience; yet that is precisely what happened to the "Canada" in the harbor of Oran, Algeria.

The vessel which flies the English flag, with a valuable cargo on board, caught fire. In spite of the efforts of crew and tugs it was found impossible to subdue the flames. A destroyer towed the ship to a safe place and fired a torpedo under the water line. The vessel sank in comparatively shallow water, which of course instantly put out the fire, and she was then repaired and raised.—From Popular Mechanics for October.

THREATEN TO KILL WHITES.

TUCSON, Ari., Sept. 18.—There is a serious condition in Arizona as a result of the refusal of the Papago Indian tribe to surrender an Indian named Pohns, who murdered a Mexican about two weeks ago. The Indian police and deputy sheriffs report that they are unable to effect John's arrest.

Sheriff Hacheo called upon the rangers for help today and 10 of them, under Captain Harry Wheeler, with the sheriff's posse, are on the way to the scene, which is 100 miles from Tucson. The Indians are usually peaceable, but now threaten death to any whites who venture to their village.

PILE IN

LETTERS FROM BRITISH ISLES INDICATE THAT THOUSANDS OF SKILLED WORKMEN ANXIOUS TO BECOME CITIZENS OF CLATSOP.

A complaint frequently heard that Canada is securing the best immigrants as settlers, namely the people of the British Isles—noted for their observance of law and their industry, combined with their knowledge of the English language—has been rendered negative by the work of the Chamber of Commerce.

Over 75 letters were received by Manager Whyte yesterday in response to advertisements for men in the big dailies of the cities across "the pond." The letters are from carpenters and all classes of skilled workmen, and the tone of the letters is an anxious desire to make good in the west and that conditions in the "old country" are very poor for the working man. Thousands of them are walking around different localities looking for work.

A noticeable fact is that nearly all the letters have been written the same day that the first advertisement appeared in the papers. This shows the anxiety prevalent in the British Isles to come out to this country, and the reason the immigrants go to Canada is that they hear more about that country. Without an exception the handwriting of the letters is excellent, and in most cases appear to have been written by educated men.

This venture of the Chamber of Commerce to advertise this section for settlement is the first of the kind to be taken up by any similar organization in any American city, so far as is known. The great results gained with the initiative advertising shows what could be done to secure the most desirable immigrants for the United States.

The indications are that the answers from foreign points are going to exceed the answers from eastern points by a large margin, and if this is the case, the Chamber of Commerce will be mystified as to what to do with all the people who want to come to this district.
