FRESNO, Cal., Sept. 21.-Alex Franco and Damino Asborno, two Italians employed in the Italian-Swiss Winery at Kingsburg, were suffocated in a wine vat this afternoon.

Asborno, in company with a man named John Necci, was ordered by Franco to go into the big vat and wash out the interior.

When the men went to enter the vat, they neglected to take the usual prethe bottom. Soon cries for help were heard and Necci crawled out, almost overcome with the fumes and gasping that Asborne was asphyxiated. Franco Immediately prepared to enter the vat. Fine For Ignoring Injunction

GREENVILLE, Miss., Sept. 21 .- For the first time in the history of Mi-sissippi, the president of a corporation was sentenced to jail today for violating an injunction granted by a state court, when Chancellor Percy Bell in Chambers here fined S.
