GROWING BAMBOO IN AMERICA. The cultivation of bamboo in America is being exploited by the Japanese. The experiment is being carried on in British Columbia on a large scale, says Popular Mechanics (October). The cultivation of bamboo is very profitable in Japan, the returns varying from \$20 to \$90 per acre. With a successful cultivation of the plant in British Columbia the Japanese hope to work up a big trade in bamboo furniture. SEE-SAW TARGET FOR BIG GUNS. One of the most unique targets ever devised is in use at the greatest school of naval gunnery in the world—Whale Island, Portsmouth, England. At the same time the car on which the target is carried moves back and forth, giving motion in two directions at the same moment. BRIDGING A CHASM IN A CAVE. In driving the huge tunnel beneath Lookout Mountain, says the October Popular Mechanics, a serious obstacle was encountered. A huge cavern starts at the Tennessee side of the mountain, intersects the tunnel and emerges in Alabama at a point 18 miles distant. Efforts were made to fill across the cave with the blasted rock taken from the tunnel, but only a slight impression was made and the attempt was abandoned. It has now been decided to throw a bridge across the chasm, which, if successfully accomplished, will be a feat entirely new and novel in bridge construction.

GORKY MARRIED COMPANION.

Harold McGrath Back From Europe With Story About Novelist.

NEW YORK, Sept. 23.—Harold McGrath, the story writer, who arrived yesterday aboard the Red Star liner Filial said he had spent some time on the island of Capri, off the Italian coast. He met there the Russian revolutionist and novelist, Maxim Gorky. The Russian admitted that his views of the marriage relation had undergone a change, and that he had formally married Mme. Andreeva, who was his companion on his visit to America.

Mr. McGrath said that he had heard, not from Gorky himself, but from other sources, that Gorky had made within the last year \$100,000 through novel and magazine writing, and that he had given \$90,000 of that to promote the cause of the revolution in Russia.

WELLMAN EXPLAINS FAILURE. Pole Hunter Thought Three Years Necessary for Success.

LONDON, Sept. 23.—A dispatch to the Daily Mail from Trondheim, says that Walter Wellman, who has arrived there, says that when the north polar expedition, of which he is the leader, was organized, he announced that it might continue for three years.

He did not expect to establish anything the first year beyond establishing a plant. He did not hope to reach the pole the second year. He would have been able to do so except for the continuously phenomenal bad weather, he said.

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LESH DESCRIBES AEROPLANE.

L. G. Lesh, the promising American aeronaut, is a frequent contributor to Popular Mechanics Magazine. In the October number he describes a three-mile flight he made with an aeroplane over the St. Lawrence river in tow of a motor boat. The object of the flight was to study the behavior and control of the aeroplane when pulled by an independent power before installing a motor. The aeronaut made several repairs to the machine while suspended in air.

ELECTRIC CONVEYOR LOADS SHIPS.

A new electric conveyer is being used for loading and unloading ships, reducing the expense over hand labor \$50 to \$65 per day. The conveyer operates at any angle, is from 25 to 50 feet in length and can be transported any place. There is an automatic registering device which accounts for every package, no matter how small, that passes over it. The conveyer will transport any angle, is from 25 to 50 feet in cases, barrels, bundles of shingles or bales per hour, according to weight and size.—From an illustrated article in the October Popular Mechanics.
