increase of acreage this year the crop was expected by statisticians to break previous records, but frost reports have been frequent on the Chicago Board of Trade, and caused the prices to flutter.

Now comes the report of Col. A. D. Davidson, an intimate associate of President William McKenzie, of the Canadian Northern Railway, not only denying that there has been frost but giving out the estimate of crop. His report says: "I find that the province of Saskatchewan gives promise of raising the best crop in her history. The weather has been very favorable for all growing crops and after making an extensive tour through these three provinces, I estimate the wheat crop of 1907 at \$5,000,000. The crops in Manitoba have made wonderful progress during the last three or four weeks. By covering most of the country in a motor car I had abundant opportunity to view the situation close at hand."

This report gives promise of another year of prosperity for 200,000 farmers from Illinois, Iowa, Wisconsin, Minnesota and the Dakotas who are now grain growers Canadian Northern began construction work a few years ago, but three settlers were found in one strip 100 miles long; there are now, according to this report, 220,000 acres in crop in the same region.

Treasury officials are confronted by a puzzle that is keeping them awake at night, and Assistant Secretary James Reynolds daily is discovering additional gray hairs in his thatch. It has to do with the "conscience fund." Some years ago an old soldier in a Middle Western State was compelled to refund \$430 which he had drawn as back pension, because the Pension Commissioner unofficially declared he was not entitled to it. Shortly after the Pension Bureau reversed the decision. The \$430, however, had disappeared into the "conscience fund" and under the law it cannot be recovered except by special act of Congress. Whether Congress will do this or no, remains to be seen, but in the meantime Secretary Reynolds is being bombarded with demands for payment. There is an additional contribution to the "fund" this week when an envelope containing 40 cents and postmarked "Thousand Islands, N. Y." was received. Mr. Reynolds declared that had the amount been thirty cents he could have identified the stricken conscience as that of a summer hotel keeper.

Although Secretary Metcalf has pointedly denied them, the rumors that he is to withdraw from the head of the Navy Department will not down. Ever since the clash of statements made by the Secretary and Mr. Loeb, concerning the movements of the battleship fleet, these reports have been persistent. It will be remembered that Mr. Metcalf announced that it had been definitely determined to send the fleet to Pacific waters while Mr. Loeb declared as emphatically that no decision has been reached. For a time relations between the two officials were decidedly strained, and the fact that President Roosevelt refused to be drawn into the matter took this inaction on the part of the President as proof that Mr. Loeb's peculiar affront, if the not inquired, had at least the approval of Mr. Roosevelt. There is every reason to believe that there is considerable foundation for the rumors. It would not be a great surprise if the California withdrew from the Cabinet before Congress meets.

Government ownership railways will be a good thing for Japan, if the present plans of the Mikado's government are carried out. Accompanying the nationalization of the railways of the Island Empire the government authorities have concluded to carry out a thorough arrangement and improvement on a grand scale of all government lines. The work is to be completed in 5 years, at an estimated cost of approximately \$75,000,000. This amount is to be about equally divided between the construction of new and improved rolling stock and improved roadbeds and stations.

COVINGTON MAY BE CAPTURED. Plain Clothes Men Disappear on Mysterious Clew at Seattle.

SEATTLE, Sept. 26.-Great mystery existed at police headquarters this morning over the sudden disappearance from the station of from two to five plain clothes policemen, who are said to have left the city before daybreak today to capture Charles Burlison and Frank Covington, the alleged murderers of Mrs. Agnes True McCombs Covington, whose body was found in a trunk on the beach at Alki Point Sunday morning. The greatest secrecy is maintained about the departure of the officers. Chief of Police C. W. Wappenstein, while ad-

mitting he knew where and why the men were gone, positively declined to give out for publication their destination or their plans. That Covington and Burlison have been located is generally believed, but just where no one who knows will tell.

Chief Wappenstein was at his desk earlier than usual this morning and denied himself to several callers, for the reason that he was almost momentarily expecting to hear some word from his men and did not want to be disturbed. If the information that called the policemen away is found to be good, it is believed that before nightfall the suspected men will be in custody. The police have dropped all theories besides the one that Mrs. Covington was killed in the Covington rooms at the Keswick, at Ninth avenue and Stewart streets, some time between Tuesday afternoon, September 3, and Thursday night, September 5.

The police have information from one man that Covington was seen at First avenue and Pike streets on the morning of September 12, and that Burlison was seen in the city on the following day. Information received by the police last night was that both Burlison and Covington were seen in Everett within the last week. Burlison is said to have a brother at Vancouver, B. C., and there is some reason to believe that he might attempt to go there.
