DECLARED NOT GUILTY.

Charles Johnson Acquitted in His Trial on Charge of Felonious Assault.

The arguments before the jury in the case of Charles Johnson, who has been on trial for the past two days, were concluded yesterday. The crime with which Johnson was charged was a heinous one and considerable interest was manifested in the outcome. In argument District Attorney Hedges made a strong plea for conviction. He was followed by Attorney Brownell who made a passionate speech and asked for justice, which was all he wished. Attorney Eiken followed, in behalf of the defendant, and, in a cool, impressive way, spoke convincingly of the character of the evidence against the accused. He analyzed it thoroughly and, while not forcing his ideas upon the jury, endeavored to convince them of Johnson's innocence. The final closing argument was made by the district attorney, who forcibly declared the guilt of the accused proved. Judge McBride then instructed the jury in a charge that was declared, by both sides, to be a fair impartial one, the explanation of the law being on a par with the judge's former charges, clear and to the point. The jury retired at 2:30 p. m. and after deliberating for one hour in a verdict of not guilty. Johnson was the recipient of many congratulations from his friends, as were also his attorneys, who had so well handled his case, which appeared at first sight to be a serious one.

The steamer City of Panama arrived down from Portland last evening with a large crowd of passengers and much freight and left for San Francisco.

The barkentine Wrestler cleared at the custom house yesterday for San Pedro with 340,000 feet of lumber, loaded at Linnton, and 190,000 feet of lumber, loaded at Rainier. The schooner Mable Gale cleared for San Francisco with a cargo of 900,000 feet of lumber loaded at Knappton.

The steamer Breakwater arrived in yesterday morning from Coos Bay with freight and passengers.

The lighthouse tender Columbine left out yesterday on at least a six months' cruise that will include all the light stations in Southeastern Alaska. The hold of the Columbine is filled with supplies of all kinds and she is loaded down as she has only frequently been. She will first stop at Grays Harbor, then to Destruction Island following this with delivering supplies to a few light stations before reaching Seattle from where the actual start north will be commenced and then rejoined by the inspector who will make an examination and experiment with fog signals.

The pilot schooner Joseph Pulitzer came inside yesterday morning from her station off the mouth of the river after water and supplies. Before going out again she will be fitted with a new suit of sails.

The steam schooner Wasp, after discharging her cargo of tan bark at Portland, left out yesterday morning for Grays Harbor to load lumber for San Francisco.

The motor schooner Erie arrived in Thursday evening from Oregon coast ports.

The steamer Roanoke left out yesterday for Eureka and San Francisco with freight and passengers.

The schooner Wrestler and Transit, with cargoes of lumber for California were towed to sea Thursday.

The bar tug Wallula, which has been in Portland for some time being repaired, arrived down the river yesterday afternoon.

The French bark Genevieve Molinos, with a cargo of cement from London, arrived in port yesterday afternoon.

The French bark Turgot, with a cargo of coal from Newcastle, N. S. W., arrived in port yesterday afternoon.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

Southern part San Francisco Bay, Cal. Notice is hereby given that the ridge of the Southern California Railway, authorized by act of Congress, to cross the channel at Dumberton Point, lower part of San Francisco Bay, Cal., is now approaching the channel from both sides of the bay.

While under construction a fixed white lantern light will be shown every night from the outer end of each trestle, and during foggy weather a bell will be sounded from the end of the trestle on the west side of the channel.

For as long a time as the Secretary of War may consider it necessary, said company shall maintain in connection with said bridge a tug or other equally efficient method of towing vessels through the draw. Said tug or substitute to be capable of safely and expeditiously handling vessels at all times when navigation of adjacent waters is practicable, and said company shall furnish free of expense towage through the draw to such vessels as may require it.

When completed a draw 125 feet in length, with a clear head-room under the spans of at least ten, measured feet measured from extreme high tide level, will be permanently lighted in accordance with the regulations for lighting bridges over navigable waters.
