SITUATION IS WORSE Murders and Revolting Crimes in Macedonia. MONASTRIES ARE ATTACKED Victims Are Mutilated by Having Ears Cut Off-Murderous Attacks Are Rife in All Parts of Disorganized Foreign Country.

CHICAGO, Sept. 27.-Vienna correspondence of the Daily News says: According to the most reliable information received here the situation in Macedonia today is worse than it has been for a very long time. Murders, robberies and other crimes are everywhere rampant and the whole state of affairs is fast becoming intolerable. It would seem from the meeting at Ischil between Emperor Francis Joseph and King Edward that the great powers were at length united in demanding that reforms be carried out in Macedonia and that the small Christian Balkan states stop their racial fights.

While murders and robberies are reported from nearly every district in Macedonia, the southeastern part of the country, including Salonica, seems to be in a most disturbed condition. Private letters from semi-official sources in Salonica give a terrible picture of the situation there. Not a single day passes without a murder and sometimes two or three, and these not in lonely suburbs or outside the city, but in the busiest and most frequented parts. The Greeks are invariably the murderers. They are doing their utmost to terrify the other nationalities, especially the Bulgarians, many of whom are leaving the country as fast as they can find the means.

Some of the murders reported were committed under peculiarly revolting circumstances. A few days ago a Bulgarian peddler was found murdered on a road leading out of the city. His ears were missing and the body was fearfully mutilated. After some days the Turkish police arrested two suspects, Greeks, and put them in prison. One of them has made a confession directly implicating the Greek consulate at Salonica in the crime. The man's story is that, with two other Greeks he was sent for late one night to come to the consulate, where they met the consul. After much talking of patriotism he handed each of them a revolver and dagger and directed them to go to a certain place on a country road early the next morning and wait for a Bulgarian peasant to come along with his donkey. They were to kill the peasant and as a proof of having done so to cut off his ears and bring them to the consulate. One of the three weakened, but the other two duly carried out their murderous commission and brought the bloody proofs to the consulate. It is difficult, of course, to ascertain what amount of truth there is in this man's story, but it is a significant fact that the consul suddenly disappeared from Salonica, and is reported to have gone back to Greece.

From all parts of the country, in districts quite remote from Salonica, comes almost daily reports of the atrocities committed by the Greeks. Even the famous monasteries at far-off Mount Athos, difficult of access as they are, have not escaped these murderous attacks. The porters, gardeners and other servants of the monks, are mostly Bulgarians, and so many of them have been kidnaped and murdered during the last few weeks, that the monasteries find it nearly impossible to get servants. Strongly fortified as these places are the monks have lately doubled their precautions. The great doors are closed and barred at 7 o'clock every evening, after which hour nobody is admitted. The Bulgarian monastery at Xagrof, one of the largest and richest on Mount Athos, is kept closed the whole day and no stranger can gain admittance by any means.

Just what value can be placed on the Turkish authorities' efforts to stop these crimes can be seen from an incident that has just come to light in connection with the recent kidnaping of a young Englishman named Abbot. When this outrage was brought to the attention of the vali, Hilmi Pasha, he thought that as the abductees were certainly Greeks, it would be a good thing to employ a Greek spy to trace them and so he applied to the Greek consulate and asked for a reliable man.
