### DELEGATE COLE MAKES TALK

Says Carelessness of Fair Officials In Slighting Prominent Northerners Will Work Detriment and Opposition to Their Plans.

SEATTLE, Oct. 2 .- Alaskans, while deeply interested in the success of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition, feel that they have been slighted by the exposition management, according to Thomas Cale, Alasca's delegate to Congress. The people from the North feel that the fair officials have not consulted bottle free. bona fide Alaskan residents, as much as they should.

"There are competent men in Alaska who could fill positions with the exposition," said Mr. Cale. "The overlooking of this body of Alaskan residents has been through carelessness, doubtlessly, but it has aroused a feeling that should not exist. The primary object of the exposition, as I understand it. is the exploitation of Alaska and its resources. What men are more competent to do this than actual residents of that country? I sincerely hope that efforts will be made to offset this feeling in the North for it will be detrimental to the fair if it is not done away

Delegate Cale arrived in Seattle yesterday morning on the Northwestern. coming here from Nome, where he spent a week. He visited St. Michaels and Toilet Articles, other Alaskan cities after leaving his home at Fairbanks. When informed of the recent railroad troubles at Valdez.

"The people of Alaska," he suid, "regard the conduct of these foreign corporations who are acquiring interests in Alaska, as very little better than that of highwaymen, for the reason that they have brought in a very unlesirable class of people. These are the laborers who are brought in and organized into camps of bandits. They have taken the law into their own hands, and we feel as if our intelligence was years and enjoys an excellent appetite, insulted by their conduct. It is the feels strong and sleeps well." "People censure laboring men for organizing into labor unions for their mutual benefit, but applaud when they are organized and fight for a corporation. These imported laborers are not the typical American worgingman or Alaskans. The majority of them are nothing more than an irresponsible lot of hirelings.

"Alaska needs home rule. We need a egislature of from twenty to twentyfive members to meet as one body. I lo not believe the country is ready as yet for county or township rule. We do need a territorial secretary, treasurer, attorney-general and superintendent of public instruction. These, with the legislature, for the present, would meet all requirements.

"I do not believe the need of home govrnment admits of argument. The peoole are intelligent enough to govern themselves. I maintain, as do all Americans, that whenever a territory or community asks for a local legislature that they are entitled to it for the reason The Finest 25c meal served in Astoria, ern. "Alaska is not confronted with as many difficulties as have Been most terri tories when organized and which later become prosperous states. Take my home state of Wisconsin, for instance It then included the present states of Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, the Dakotas and parts of other states, and had but a small fraction of the population Alaska now has, and her ability to maintain home government did not compare with that of Alaska.

"Alaska's resources are far greater than those of any territory that was ever organized, with the exception of Oklahoma. Alaska is the only territory that was at the time of its organization self-supporting, with the sam exception. This territory has pai back into the treasury of the United price, which was \$7,200,000, and has also paid \$2,800,000 additional. N other territory has such a balance or its side of the sheet.

"A territory and a people that ca produce a reveune to that extent, i such a short time, requires no furthe rgument in its support.

"Another reason for asking for terri torial government is that there are many things of vast importance to us which look very insignificant at and to Wash ington. Besides it is asking too muc of congress to devote its time and at tention to the details of Alaskan legis lation. We simply ask that we be pe mitted to govern ourselves, and we wi relieve congress of that annoyance an

### GETS ROUTE TO PITTSBURG.

New York Central Leaves Right-of-Way From Arcadia, Pa.

PITTSBURG, Oct .- The Vanderbuilt interests have at last out-generaled the Pennsylvania Railroad, the Wabash and the Gould interest, and have completed their plans for running the New York Central directly into Pittsburg at a point from which they can reach New York City by a route 70 miles shorter than is now traversed by it. for a final conference. The line is an extension of the branch which now runs to Areadia in Jefferson county. The new line will cross Indiana and Westmoreland counties, following the Sewickley creek to the Yougaiogeheny river near Sutterville. Here it will join the tracks of the Pittsburg & Lake Erie, a Vanderbuilt interest, and from this yoint will enter Pittsburg.
