The city auditor yesterday filed his quarterly report which is interesting reading. According to the report the liabilities of the city exceed the resources, \$156,969.64. A detailed statement from the aditor shows that the liabilities include \$70,486.29 in muricipal warrants; \$2706.75 interest on bonds; \$118.48 street repair warrants; \$11,067.84 in street warrants. City hall warrants. \$112, municipal bonds \$189,050 and street bonds \$5,253.32 make up the liabilities in addition to the other items. The resources of the city are made up by taxes due, \$12,822.44; real property, \$66,200; street assessments, due, \$13, 653.20, and cash in the hands of the treasury, \$29,149.40. The total resources are \$121,825.04; liabilities, \$278,794.68.

GERMAN PRAISES BRITONS.

Reports English Troops Pursuing Hottentots Showed Great Endurance.

BERLIN, Oct. 3.-Captain Von Hagen of the German army, who accompanied the British column of troops commanded by Colonel Elliott in the pursuit and in the Kalabri district of Cape Colony, recently, has reported to the general terms of the endurance of the British troopers. They marched 35 hours without water for the men or their horses, in burning heat and over a sandy desert, covering 80 miles in 24 hours.

Morenga was the Hottentot leader who caused so much trouble to the Germans in southwest Africa, from which he fled to Cape Colony. His son, uncle, and secretary were killed in the encounter with Colonel Elliott's force.
