WATERFRONT ITEMS

Schooner Antelope is a Total Loss in Wreck.

GOES ASHORE NEAR NEHALEM

Belonged to Elmore & Company, of Astoria, and Had Been Chartered to the Wheeler Lumber Company--Covered by Insurance.

The schooner Antelope, belonging to Elmore & Company, while being towed out from Nehalem on October 2, ran on the South Spit and is reported to be a total loss.

Elmore & Company had chartered her to the Wheeler Lumber Company, of Nehalem, and it is understood that she is fully insured.

The British steamship Comeric, which came into this port on Wednesday night short of coal, took on 60 tons last night and under instructions from her owners left out yesterday morning for Port Townsend to await orders.

PORTLAND, Oct. 3.—Good apples are short in Portland and sometime will elapse before the shortage ceases. The market has been pretty well supplied with early varieties, but demands have been such that it is thought that the supply will cease before the later varieties arrive.

The poultry market is weak but it is thought that an early improvement will show.

Eggs are firm, the local product having the call, by from two to three cents per dozen.

Cauliflower shows up in splendid quality, coming from local gardens, and brings \$1.25 to \$1.50 per dozen.
