

CHICAGO, Oct. 7 .- General William Booth, commander in chief of the Salvation Army, today brought Chicago and the United States a message of the need of thrift, a warning of the dangers that lie in wait. General Booth said that the end of the era of high wages is in sight; that a growing population meant less food and clothing for each individual This problem must be solved in England and America, in part, he said, as it has been solved in Indo-China and Japan. "The physical standard of living must be lowered,' said the leader of the Salvation Army, "but this will only be half of the solution. It must be aided by moral and intellecutal progress upward."
