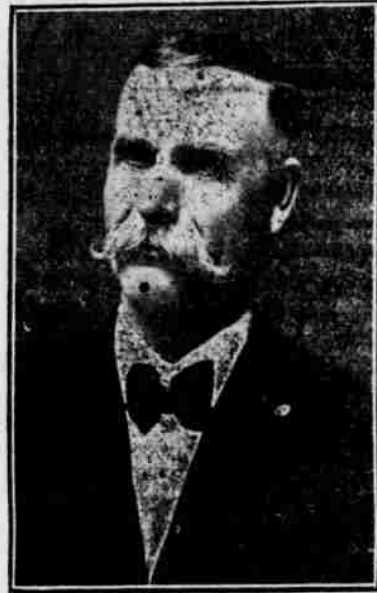

WATERFRONT ITEMS

Charter Rates Are Soaring Upwards Daily.

40 SHILLINGS IS EXPECTED

Orndale Chartered to Load Wheat at Big Figure—Steamer Alliance Arrives in From Coos Bay—Other Shipping News at the Mouth of the Columbia.

PORTLAND, Oct. 10.—Another big tramp, the British steamship Orndale, of 2305 tons net register, was chartered this morning to transport a cargo of wheat from Portland to the United Kingdom. She is bound from Newcastle, N. S. W., for San Francisco with a cargo of coal. The steamer has an actual carrying capacity of 6500 tons. She is expected to arrive for December loading. Of late practically every tramp steamer engaged to carry wheat to Europe has been taken at from 35s to 36s 3d. For spot tonnage a much higher rate is paid. A steamer available at once was offered 37s 6d yesterday, and some say the tariff will reach the 40-shilling mark before another fortnight. Near-by tonnage is in great demand, little attention being paid to vessels not due for several months. The unusual demand from Europe for American wheat is held to be due largely to the fact that the grades needed, formerly imported from Australia and India, have to be purchased in the United States this year. It is said no white wheat can be had in India or Australia this season. Since that supply source has been cut off it is necessary for buyers in the European markets to get the product from America.

The steamer Roanoke will sail this morning for San Pedro via Eureka and San Francisco. She carries a full cargo of freight and passenger list. The steamer Elder of the same line came off of the drydock at Portland yesterday and will go on her regular run next Friday.

The Norwegian steamship, Admiral Borrensen, is on the way down the river and will arrive this morning. She carries 3,403,000 feet of lumber and is bound for Taku Bar, China.

The steamer Alliance arrived in from Coos Bay yesterday with her usual cargo of freight and passengers. She was delayed here several hours while Captain Olsen and several members of the crew testified in the Bowsby case.

The steamer City of Panama left out yesterday morning for San Francisco. She was delayed coming down the river which caused her to get away several hours late.

The oil tank steamers Asuncion and Maverick arrived in from San Francisco yesterday.

The British bark Largo Bay sailed from Valparaiso for the Columbia River on October 6. She comes seeking charter.

Supposed Attempt at Burglary—Last night at 9:45 Officers Houghton and Thompson were called to a case of supposed attempt at burglary, on the corner of Twelfth and Franklin avenue. On the southwest corner of the above named streets there are flats occupied by the families of W. J. De Lashmut and Frank Delaney, and at the hour above mentioned noises were heard in the basement. Mrs. Delaney heard the noises and undertook to investigate, assisted by a young lady who was in the house, with the result that a man was seen jumping over the fence and disappearing in the darkness. When the officers arrived, a thorough search of the house and vicinity was made, and nothing suspicious was discovered. The people occupying the adjoining house are absent and it is thought that probably it was intended to burglarize that dwelling.

ARKANSAS SUES FOR TAXES.

CALCUTTA, Oct. 10.—There was serious rioting last night in connection with a meeting held in honor of some students who were recently punished for attacking the police. The crowd pelted the police with stones. Many assaults were committed and shops were looted. Forty policemen were injured, but no arrests were made. The rioting was renewed today. A number of students and roughs collected on the roofs and in the roadways and pelted the street cars and passers-by with brickbats. Europeans were especially singled out for attack.
