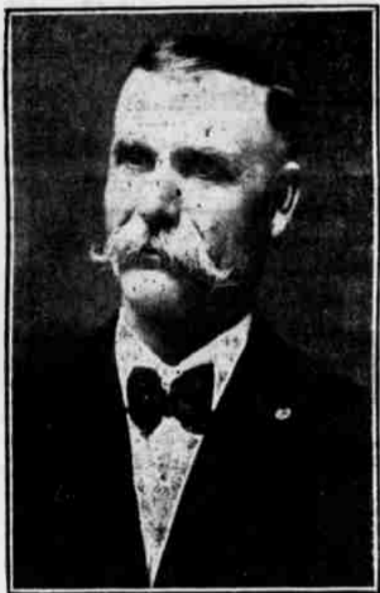

**COMPELLED TO EAT DOGS.**

Stefanssen Tells of Mikelsen Polar Trip.

CHICAGO, Oct. 11.—Details of the hardships experienced by members of the Leffingwell-Mikelsen polar expedition, which was icebound in Beauford sea for nearly a year, reached Chicago yesterday, with V. Stefanssen, ethnologist of the expedition.

Ernest De Koven Leffingwell, representing the University of Chicago, who was jointly in command of the expedition, is safe in northern seas, with other members of the expedition.

Although he was present when the expedition's ship Duchess of Bedford went down and at one time was compelled to eat one of the dogs which made up his team, he is reported none the worse for the experience.

**MURDER TRIAL OPENS.**

**TO SETTLE AFFAIRS TODAY**

PROMOTION COMMITTEE AND WILLIAM REID WILL MAKE FINAL ARRANGEMENTS ABOUT RIGHT-OF-WAY THROUGH CLATSOP COUNTY.

William Reid of the Portland-Oregon & Seacoast Railroad has been asked to meet the promotion committee of the Chamber of Commerce this afternoon and he is expected to arrive on the noon train. At this meeting the right-of-way matters interfering with the construction of the new railroad will be practically straightened out so that construction work may commence immediately.

The price agreed on for the contested right-of-way will be put up by Mr. Reid, and both the latter and the deeds will be placed in escrow to await the completion of about one-third of the road. If nothing is done within the required period, the money will be returned to Mr. Reid and the deeds to the property owners.

Every indication points toward an amicable solution of the railroad's trouble with property owners, and with the exception of the Kinneys, most of the Clatsop county people have agreed to allow the railroad to develop this section.

**CZAR STIRS GERMANS.**

Cancellation of Orders for Ships Causes Discussion.

COPENHAGEN, Oct. 11.—Concerning the Czar's order that no Russian man-of-war shall be built outside of Russia, the correspondent learns the following from a prominent Russian diplomat. At the meeting of Kaiser and Czar at Swinemunde one of the principal questions discussed was whether German shipyards should build part of the Russian navy. The Kaiser, who is very much interested in the shipbuilding industry of the fatherland, induced the Czar to promise to place a number of big battleship orders in Germany.

When the Anglo-Russian treaty was completed, however, the Czar, under pressure from England, changed his mind and withdrew the German order, commanding that no warship could be built outside of Russia. The Czar's remarkable telegram of commendation to the Danish firm that built his yacht, the Standart, and several of his cruisers is looked upon as a blot aimed at Germany.

**VOLIVA HATES TO GIVE UP.**

Files Petitions to Revoke Lease of Zion City.

CHICAGO, Oct. 11.—Wilbur G. Voliva has prepared six petitions praying Judge Landis to revoke Zion City's 1100-year lease and asking that warranty deeds be given instead. This action is taken to enable Voliva's followers to sell the property and move to his settlement in New Mexico. More than \$100,000 worth of improved property has already been listed for sale and \$9000 worth of unimproved land. If this petition is granted by the federal court, Voliva will be able to erect a temporary tabernacle within the limits of the city. It may be necessary to have a test case in order to break the lease.

**TO PARTICIPATE IN RACE.**

Major Hersey Will Represent the United States.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—Secretary Wilson today authorized Major Henry R. Hersey, who assisted Walter Wellman in his aerial dash for the Pole, to represent the government in the international aeronautic cup race from St. Louis October 21st. Major Hersey will use the same balloon in which Lieutenant Lahm won in the international aeronautic race held in Europe last year. He will make temperature and humidity observations at various altitudes during his flight across the country to the Pacific Coast. This will be the first aeronautic race ever held in the United States, and all of the leading European aeronautic clubs will be represented.

**A New Picture Show.**

Wilson's moving picture show will open tonight at 7:30 at 548 Commercial street in the room formerly occupied by the Ges Restaurant. It will be a continuous show and will be similar to the Nickelodeon which showed successfully here during the summer. This show will afford a fine opportunity for spending part of the evenings of fall and winter and will no doubt be a success from its opening.
