BRUTALLY BEATEN

The Evident Intent of Assailant Was Robbery.

CAPTURED AFTER HOT CHASE

Mrs. Marie McCordle, a Railroad Ticket Agent in Brooklyn, N. Y., is Assaulted by a Miscreant Who Cruelly Beats Her Into Insensibility.

BROOKLYN, Oct. 16.—As the result of an early morning attack, with evident intent to rob, in which she was brutally beaten with an iron coupling pin and left unconscious, Mrs. Marie McCordle, a ticket agent for the B. R. T. in the "L" station at Fifth avenue and Twenty-fifth street, is today lying in the Norwegian Hospital with her head and face a mass of bruises and a possible fracture of the skull. Her assailant, Daniel Murphy, 24 years old, and homeless, was captured after a chase and held by Magistrate Gleason in the Fifth avenue court without bail for the grand jury.

Murphy was taken before Mrs. McCordle in the hospital today and positively identified as the man who had tried to snatch money from her hand and later beat her with an iron bar.

Mrs. McCordle, who is a widow, living at 1430 Seventieth street, has been in the employ of the B. R. T. since her husband died five years ago. She was making her customary reckoning of the day's receipts in the ticket office shortly before 3:30 o'clock this morning pending the arrival of the collecting car. The money was spread out before her in change and bills when her assailant sprang upon her.

The cries of Mrs. McCordle evidently frightened her assailant, for he dashed to the tracks and started a hasty flight downtown. W. B. Johnson, of 219 Foster avenue, walking in the street below, heard the widowed ticket agent's screams and saw the figure of a man silhouetted against the sky, where streaks of breaking dawn could be seen. He ran along Fifth avenue, keeping pace with

the fugitive ahead. In a few minutes scores had joined in the chase.

Murphy clambered onto the platform of the station at Twentieth street and raced to the street. He had a lead over his pursuers of about a quarter of a block. He ran along Fifth avenue to Eighteenth street and turned up to Seventh avenue, where he ran into the arms of Patrolman Thompson, of the Fifth avenue station.

The crowd approached, threatened violence and lynching. Thompson had a struggle before he could get his prisoner in safety to the station house.

Later the young couple to whom she had been introduced were married. To her dismay, the woman learned they had leased the very house where she had experienced the harrowing dream.

What was she to do? She asked her friends. They were at a loss to give her advice. The woman was convinced that she was given the premonition of a tragedy. At the same time she dreaded provoking a disagreement in case there should be nothing but a hallucination.

STILL WORKING AWAY

Standard Oil Company Prepares Elaborate Defense.

GOVERNMENT ATTORNEYS END.

Spend Entire Day Bringing Out and Placing on Record Statements Submitted by Witnesses Showing Profits Made by Standard.

NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—Counsel for the Standard Oil Company have prepared an elaborate defense in the government's suit for the dissolution of the oil combine, which they say, will be developed in its entirety. Government's attorneys have concluded taking their testimony, and the Standard's lawyers said today that they had not sought to adduce any testimony on the cross examination of officials and employees of the so-called oil trust which would refute the allegations in the federal complaint, but had deferred in bringing out such evidence until later, when it could be produced continuously and in its bulk, no intimidation was given as to the nature of the testimony which counsel for the trust would bring out. A telegram was sent to William G. Rockefeller, assistant treasurer of the Standard Oil Company, of New York, last night by counsel for the Standard that the government desired him as a witness before the adjournment is taken next Friday for a month. Frank B. Kellogg of counsel for the government spent the entire day in placing on record statements submitted by special witnesses showing the profits made by the Standard Company in different localities of the country. Statements were produced showing that the Standard not only secured information concerning competitive shipments in the United States but also in foreign countries.
